Deloatch, my Daughter Martha Ann Deloatch and my son Madison C. Deloatch all to share and share alike - I make and ordain my beloved brother Edward Edwards my Executor to this my last Will and Testament in Witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal the day year above written - Signed sealed and published this to be my last will and testament before me the

First, I have unto my son Harrison Boyce the plantation on which I now live my negro woman Cook & Mary girl Charity and Charles to them the said Harrison during his life after his death my will and desire is that all the above named property & increase shall be equally divided between my son Harrison's Children begotten by his present wife to them and their heirs for ever my will and desire is at my death that all my stock of Hogs and cattle be equally divided between the sons of said Harrison Boyce and all my household furniture be equally divided between the daughters of said Harrison Boyce to them and their heirs for ever this 13th of March 1843 -
