First I give unto the said and I give during their natural life the several hundred acres of land called The Van Spring adjoining the lands of Mrs. Charles Sauter
Second I give and bequeath unto Elizabeth & Public Lawyer Jacob, to him and his heirs forever
Third I give and bequeath unto John Brown two Negroes named the Lady and Henry to him and his heirs forever
Fourth I give and bequeath unto Francis Brown two Negroes named Leah and Charles named Mary to him and his heirs forever
Fifth I give and bequeath unto the said Mary Henry formerly Mary Brown two Negroes named Peggy and Mary to him and his heirs forever
Sixth I give and bequeath unto Elizabeth & Public all the lands which I may own in possession of to him and his heirs forever and I also give and bequeath unto the said Elizabeth & Public all the remainders of my Negroes which I have not heretofore disposed of of my stock of long description the Captains residing on the plantation and every other species of property which I may obtain possession of to him and his heirs forever
Seventh It is my particular request that Elizabeth & Public should in consideration of the above property which I have bequeathed unto him take care provide for and protect my two old negroes Sarah and Phillis during their life and also have them a comfortable house built on the land I have bequeathed them
Eighth I do hereby constitute and appoint Elizabeth & Public Executor to this my last will and Testament and I hereby appoint I have bequeathed to my hands and affixed my seal this twentieth day of July Eighteen then and there four

Eliza Langford Will. In the name of God Amen I Eliza Langford of the County of Northampton and State of North Carolina being weak in body but of sound mind and disposing memory do make and publish my last will and Testament
First I have unto my beloved wife Lucretia Langford after paying all my just debts during her natural life the balance of my property which is in my possession or any that may come into my possession hereafter, or any that may come to me from my brother Wm. Langford
Second I give and bequeath unto my Brother, Stephen and Amos B. Langford and Lucy Lawrence, after the death of my wife Lucretia Langford all the property

that may then be remaining or that may not take to support myself, to them and their heirs forever. To have and share alike
Third I do hereby nominate make and ordain James B. Grant my only Executor - In witness whereof I have hereunto affixed my hand and seal this 30th day of July 1834

William Draper Will. In the name of God Amen I William Draper of Northampton County being weak in body but of sound mind and disposing memory do make and publish my last will and Testament in manner and form following
First My wife Maria is that my beloved wife, I wish that she should have the use of all my property both real and personal after all my debts is paid, during her natural life or until otherwise for her own use and to raise and support her children in person
Second I give unto my son James B. Draper one grey horse for his own use and the use of my wife & family towards raising their support among plantations
Third To my wife that if my debts should be pressing and my creditors will not wait till the money can be raised off of my plantations such part of my property should be sold as my wife & family may choose to dispose of for their discharge
Fourth To my wife that if my wife should remain undivided till my youngest child arrives to a useful age and if either of my children should choose to settle off on any part of said land that they should have the privilege of living on any of my land James B. should advance any money from his own earnings towards the discharge of my debts it is also my wish that I should be made good to him out of my estate before a division between my children
Fifth To my wife and also that after my wife's death or marriage all my lands and estate if any should be sold and equally divided between my children
