Northampton and State of North Carolina being of sound mind and
recollecting in hopes to God through mercies from both in justice and
knowing that all must die at one time or die, do make & ordain this to be my
last will & testament hereby making all others

1st I wish all my just debts to be paid

Item I am willing that my dear negro man Jeph should be left to the care of
my Brother Thomas Lawrence and his representatives and if my wish shall be
should be supported in his old age but of some portion of my property
an amount of his being a faithful and careful servant & besides my mean-
ing is that the old man should be supported when he becomes unable to support
himself

Item I leave to my dear wife Elizabeth R. Lawrence during her nat-
ural life or widowhood all the property which I own or did bequeath and
possess of for the support of her self and my beloved son William
Lawrence and should I have no lawful descendant who may
arrive at mature age (viz) should my child die without a lawful
issue or before he arrives at the age of maturity, as the death of my
dearly beloved wife Elizabeth R. Lawrence is it is my will that my
property should be equally divided between my three nephews, sons
of my brother Thomas Lawrence (viz) John Thomas Lawrence,
William Joseph Lawrence and James Merain Lawrence to
them & their heirs forever

Item I desire my beloved brother Thomas Lawrence to act as Guardian for my
dearly beloved son William Thomas Lawrence, and in the event of my
not leaving a lawful heir whom my arrival at the age of maturity
in the event of my child's death it is my will that my dear brother
Thomas Lawrence should act as agent for my nephew his three nephews
John Thomas Lawrence, William Joseph Lawrence and James
Merain Lawrence

(Lastly) I hereby appoint my dear beloved brother Thomas Lawrence
executor of this my last will & testament
signed, sealed and obtained in presence of us

John Tuttle Will

In the name of God Amen John Tuttle of the County of Northampton
State of North Carolina being weak of body but of sound sense & memory
thanks be to God for the same & knowing that it is appointed of God for
all men once die do make & ordain this my last will & testament
in manner & form following (viz) I do leave unto my daughter
Susan Tuttle the house which my son Willie Tuttle now lives to
gether with the lands lying on the west side of the branch running
through my plantation or so much thereof as she may think proper
to cultivate. Also the two rooms in the west end of my house with
one few poles so long as the way has single and no longer & also
land unto my daughter Susan Tuttle my two negro slaves Henry
Dunson her natural child also give & bequeath unto daughter Susan
Tuttle my three negro slaves Anderson I give unto Charles
Also two feather beds of furniture two Cots & Tables one horse saddle
two saddle bags one of sheep two saws one riding Dig & Harrow
one trunk one Chest one tub one tray one wash tub
three wooden Chairs three common Chairs & one fifth part of
all my powder & traps & another one six knives of steel. I give bequeath
I give bequeath unto my daughter Susan Tuttle
I have three hundred pounds of bacon one hundred & thirty five
I have three hives of bees. I give my will & ordain that my executor see my
negro man Jeph to some person within the limits of his wife & the money coming
from the sale of said negro man & give the same unto my son John Tuttle
together with all the property I have heretofore given him to have the
same forever it being his full share of my estate. I do leave unto
my daughter Mary Lambertson the lands & plantation that I purchased
Thomas Booth & my negro girl named Margaret during her natural
life & at her death to be equally divided amongst all the living chil-
dren I also give & bequeath unto my daughter Mary Lambertson
all the property that I have heretofore given her to have the same forever
I do give & bequeath unto my daughter Susan Tuttle my two negro man Jeph together
with all the property that I have heretofore lent him to have the same
forever in his share in full of my estate

Item I give & bequeath unto my son Elijah Tuttle my two negro boys Moses to have
the same forever I also leave unto my son Elijah Tuttle my two negro
boys Isaac, Sam, Mark, Mary & Harriet & their increase during his natural
life & at his death to his heirs lawfully begotten of his body but if my
son Elijah shall die without a lawful begotten heir my will & ordain is
that my four said negro boys Isaac, Sam, Mark & Harriet be equally
divided between my two grand daughters Susan Tuttle & Susan
Tuttle daughters of my son Willie Tuttle to them & their heirs forever
that being my son & Elijah Tuttle's share of my estate

I give by my will unto my son Milla Futrell the land & plantation where I now live except the part heretofore lent to my daughter and her death the whole plantation to him this heirs forever. I also by my will unto my son Milla Futrell my negro man an Atlas during his natural life and at his death I give & bequeath unto my grand daughter Susan Futrell said negro Atlas to her this heirs forever. I also give by my will unto my son Milla Futrell all my three negroes (Sally, Din Pleasant & Peter, also my Blacksmith tools six chairs of book & brass, three Cops & corn one half of my Cider Casks one walnut table one ash table one desk one buffet one blue chest three wooden chairs three common chairs one hand saw one crop cut saw & all my Carpenters & Carvers tools for a gunst^l Chain two cases & Calves five head of sheep one horse bridle & saddle one horse mill & two sows & pigs to him this heirs forever, it being the share of my estate

Item at the death of my daughter Susanna Futrell, I give by my will unto my grand daughter Susan Futrell my two negroes Cassius & Henry to her this heirs forever.

Item I give by my will unto my daughter Sally Foyner my negro woman Filder this woman to her and her heirs forever also unto my daughter Sally Foyner my three negroes (Sally, Susan, & Charlotte & Charles Susan) during her natural life, and at her death to be equally divided amongst all her heirs lawfully Begotten of her & to go to them over their heirs forever.

Item I give by my will unto my daughter Sally Foyner one fourth part of my estate to her this heirs forever.

Item I give & bequeath unto my daughter Elizabeth Sumner one fourth part of my estate to her this heirs forever.

Item I give by my will unto my daughter Anna Russell one fourth part of my estate to her this heirs forever.

Item my will & desire is that the balance of my ~~estate~~ ^{estate} ~~left~~ ^{left} ~~over~~ ^{over} after the death of my two daughters Sally Foyner & Mary Samberton & my two ~~step~~ ^{step} daughters Susan & Elizabeth Sumner to them & their heirs forever.

Item my will & desire is that all my money debts that may be found at my death be equally divided between my daughter Susanna Futrell & my grand daughter Susan Futrell daughter of my son Milla Futrell to them & their heirs forever.

Item my will & desire is that all my property not heretofore given away be sold by my executor, other money arising from the sale of said property to be equally divided amongst my three daughters Mary Samberton Susanna Futrell Sally Foyner & my two ~~step~~ ^{step} daughters Elizabeth Sumner & Anna Russell to them & their heirs forever.

Last by my will I appoint Constable & ordain my good & faithful friend Thomas Foyner to answer my son Milla Futrell's whole & sole content, this my last will & testament as aforesaid, all with heart & conscience by me made & signed, whereof I have hereunto set my hand & affixed my seal this 6th day of January 1834.

Nicholas Popes Will

In the name of God Amen I Nicholas Pope of the County of Northampton and State of North Carolina, being in perfect mind the weak in body, make this my last will and Testament.

Item, that it is my will and desire that all my property of every description be kept together during my living & after Sally, widowhood or natural life, which ever may first happen.

Item I leave to my loving wife Sally, for the support of herself and my children lawfully begotten of her body, all my property both real and personal during her natural life or widowhood, which may first happen, and at her death or marriage to be divided among my children in the following manner, to wit - My Land to be equally divided among my boys and my girls to have as much of my personal Estate as will make their Estate equal to the real estate of my boys, and the balance of any to be equally divided among all my children.

Item I do hereby constitute my loving & faithful my wife ~~Sally~~ ^{Sally} executor and authorized this 27 day of February in the year of our Lord 1835. It is also my will and desire that my boy John be sole executor, and the proceeds be appropriated, as above, and be further empowered my executor to see it well done, he may think proper any or all of my other Slaves that may refuse to be controlled by her.
