Item I give and bequeath to my son Alexander Grovers one bed & furniture & the following negroes to wife one negro woman named Nancy two negro boys named Anderson & Cain, two negro girls named Cherry and Mary with all their future increase to him and his heirs forever -

After the death of my wife my wife and done is that all my estate both personal and moveable not apertly given and bequeathed be equally divided between my grand daughter Mary Grovers, my grand son John Grovers Jr & my son John Grovers and Nathaniel Grovers & Alexander Grovers to share alike -

Lastly I nominate and appoint John Grovers and Alexander Grovers

Executors to this my last will and testament. On Notary whereof

William C. Exum's Will. In the name of god amen I
William C. Exum of Northampton County state of North Carolina being weak
in body but of sound disposing mind and memory, do make and publish this
as my last will and testament in manner following: to wit -

First, I give to my sister Nancy Wilson during her life all my land & plantation
lying between the Halifax road and the Occaneechee swamp, and on the south side
of said road, with the privilege of getting timber for the use of said plantation
from my land lying on the north side of said road.

Second, I give and bequeath to my said sister Nancy Wilson ten acres to her, her
heirs and assigns forever.

Third, I give and bequeath to my brothers James C. and Joseph C. Exum the land
and plantation on the north side of the Halifax road: and at the death of my
sister Nancy Wilson, I also give and bequeath to my said brothers, the land
and plantation known to my said sister, or to the survivor of them, in case either
should die before my said sister, to them, or him, their heirs or assigns forever.

Fourth, I give and bequeath, to my said brothers James C. and Joseph C. Exum the
balance of my negroes after taking out the ten acres given and bequeathed
to my sister Nancy Wilson to them, their heirs and assigns forever.

Fifth, I give and bequeath to my mother all my household furniture, including beds
and I leave to her my gold watch and appurtenances during her life, and at
her death I give and bequeath the said watch to my brother Joseph C. Exum.
It is my will and desire that the residue of my Estate of whatever kind
or nature, be sold at the discretion of my Executors, herein after named
and the proceeds of such sale, after paying my debts I give and bequeath
to my mother.

Sixth, I nominate, name and appoint my friend Nathaniel B. Lockhart and my

brother James L. Exum, executors of this my last will and testament, hereby
releasing all other wills heretofore made by me.
