

Item 4th Ann Lexter one negro girl known by the name of Maria one Bed & furniture to her & her heirs forever

Fiftieth - I give & bequeath unto my beloved Daughter Mary Louisa Lexter One negro woman known by the name of Young Caty to her & her heirs forever

Fiftieth - I give & bequeath unto my beloved Daughter Susan Elizabeth Lexter one negro woman Darcas to her & her heirs forever Item 5th It is my will and desire that the land & plantation wherein John Lloyd formerly resided, as also one negro man known by the name of Tom be both sold to the highest bidder on a credit of six months and the money arising from such sale to be equally divided between my wife Mary Lexter and Daughters Martha Ann, Mary Louisa & Susan Elizabeth Lexter & sons John Thomas & James Madison Lexter to them & their heirs forever

Item 6th I loan unto my beloved wife Mary Lexter the one third part of all the rest of the land including the dwellings wherein I now live that I am at this time in possession of, for & during her natural life or widowhood, and at her decease or marriage then shall the said land to be equally divided between my two sons John Thomas & James Madison Lexter to them & their heirs forever

Item 8th I loan unto my beloved wife Mary Lexter the one sixth part of all the negroes that I am possessed of after the sale as before named during her natural life or widowhood, & at her decease or marriage to return to & be equally divided between my two sons John Thomas & James Madison Lexter to them & their heirs forever

Item 9th It is my will & desire that the remainder of all the lands which I am at this time in possession of together with my mill & pond be equally divided between my sons John Thomas and James Madison Lexter to them & their heirs forever

Item 10th It is also my will & desire that the land & plantation wherein Sally Lexter formerly resided shall at the decease of the said Sally Lexter be equally divided between my two sons John Thomas and James Madison Lexter to them & their heirs forever

Item 11th It is my will and desire that all the rest residue and remainder of my negroes not before mentioned shall be equally divided between my five children say Martha Ann, Mary Louisa, Susan Elizabeth, John Thomas & James Madison Lexter to them & their heirs forever

Item 12th I give & bequeath unto my son John Thomas Lexter my Boundary stick &c to him & his heirs forever

Item 13th I give & bequeath unto my beloved wife Mary Lexter my gogg mace to her & her heirs forever

Item 14th It is my will & desire that all the rest of my stock of horses, hawks, cattle, hogs &c as also my crop of corn with the exception of twelve months support for my beloved wife Mary and

my five children as before named together with the rest of her goods to be sold & the money arising from such sale to be applied to the use of satisfying my just debts, and the rest of any to be equally divided among my beloved wife Mary and my five children as before named to them & their heirs forever

Lastly - I do hereby constitute and appoint my worthy friend Kitchen Powell my whole & soul executor to this my last will & testament revoking all others heretofore made by me. In testimony whereof I have hereunto signed my name & affixed my seal this second day of October in the year of Christ one thousand eight hundred & thirty six

James Sowing's Will

In the name of God Amen I James Sowing, being of the County of Northampton & State of North Carolina being of sound & perfect mind & memory blessed be God to this the 15th day of October in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred & thirty six make and publish this my last will & testament in manner following to say

1st I bind to my beloved wife Rebecca the tract of land on which I now live during her life and at her death I give the said tract of land to my Daughter Anna & to her her heirs forever. My other two tracts which I bought of Collier and Ingram I give to my Daughters Martha & Mary to be equally divided between them

2d I give to each of my Daughters one Bed & furniture of which I have

already given Mary hers

3d my five other Beds & furniture I bind to my wife during her life and at her death I give to each of my Daughters one more bed & furniture and the other two to be sold & equally divided between my Daughters

4th I bind my wife one horse Charles one bay mare Elizabeth three colts & calves three cows & pigs, three goats & lambs all of my household & kitchen furniture one horse cart & wheels one large steer all of my fowls of every kind Two axes two

5th I lend to my wife during her life the following negroes Ned

6th I lend to my Daughter Anna the following negroes Henry, Tom, Lewis
& Easter during her life to my Daughter Martha I lend the
following negroes during her life Allen, Maria L, Miller, Phil & Ben
to my Daughter Mary I lend the following negroes during her life
Pleasant, Matthew, Lewis, Sterling and Caroline and should all of
my Daughters die without bearing a child or children I give to
Mary E. H. Southall of Gates County sister to Thomas J. Southall
all of my negroes & their increase to her & her heirs forever
7th I want my wife to have the years provision allowed her
8th I want all of my property not willed away by this will sold
after my Death and the proceeds after paying all of my just debts
equally Divided among my three Daughters

9th And I hereby make and appoint my friend Thomas J. Southall
Executor of this my last will & testament. In witness whereof I

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Arthur Boykin's Will.

In the name of God Amen. I Arthur Boykin of the county of Northampton
and State of North Carolina being sound in mind though weak in body
have thought it advisable to make and ordain this my last will and testament
revising all other by me made —

It is my will and desire that when I depart this life that my body be interred in a
decent and Christian like manner and my soul I commit to Almighty God who
first gave the same, and as respects my worldly treasure. I now proceed to distribute
in the following manner viz

First. It is my will and desire that all my just debts be satisfied out of what money I
am at present in possession of and what may arise from the sale of the remaining
part of my crop of cotton unsold and in case there should not be a sufficient to
satisfy such debts, my Executor hereafter appointed shall be at liberty to dispose of
such part of my personal estate as they may deem necessary to satisfy the same
and no more, and upon such terms as they may & execute shall deem most
admirable.

Item Second. Per chnra that after satisfying all my just debts as before arranged I do
leave unto my beloved wife Emily Boykin for and during her natural life, all
the rest, residue and remainder of my Estate both real and personal of every
description kind and parcel whatever for the special purpose of maintaining her
and her children, and they shall be at liberty to remain on the premises until of
humble aged at her death by the death of my beloved wife Emily Boykin
that the whole of my estate so left shall be equally divided both real and per-
sonal between such children of mine or their heirs as shall be in existence or
within the limits of the law at the day of my death to them and their heirs four-
lastly I do hereby constitute and appoint my beloved wife Emily Boykin and her
son Samuel Scott my wife and sole Executrix to this my last will and
testament. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and affixed
my seal this 30th day of December 1836.
