Item the second, I give and bequeath to Henry Fitchell one feather bed and furniture together with the sum of fifty dollars in Cash, this to her the said Henry and her heirs forever.

Item the third, after my wife's death or marriage, should she marry again then my will and desire is and do hereby give and bequeath to my beloved daughter in law Narcissa Brown the whole of my property of every description that have not been before given away, this to her the said Narcissa and her heirs forever.

And lastly I appoint and declare my worthy friends Edmund Jacobs Esq<sup>r</sup> and Joel Connor to be executors of this my last will testament made by me William G Lawrence this the sixteenth day of August in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty one.
