

22 **Arnon Parker's Will**

I Arnon Parker of County of Northampton and State of North Carolina do make my last will and Testament in manner and form following (writ) first I give to my wife Mary Parker one third part of the land where I now live also my horse and buggy also I give two cows and pigs two geese and hants one feather bed and furniture one powder dish and hason one wash bale four sitting chairs also one they near by the name of hill. Secondly I give unto my Daughter Letitia Dwyer wife of William Dwyer one fourth part of my land where he now lives to her and her heirs forever Thirdly I give unto my Daughter Martha Hicks one fourth part of my land where she now lives to her and her heirs forever Fourthly I give unto my Daughter Ann Dwyer one fourth part of my land where said Dwyer now lives to her and her heirs forever. Fifthly I give unto my Daughter Elizabeth Glover the wife of John Glover one fourth part of my land where said Glover now lives to her and her heirs forever. Sixthly It is my will and desire that the negro I have my wife and all the other property not affected away after paying my just debts be equally divided among all my children above named. Lastly I do nominate John Glover my only Executor of this my last will and Testament in full confidence that he will carry the same in to effect in all things whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this fifth day of August 1830.

In the name of God amen I Benjamin Sharrad of the County of Northampton & State of North Carolina do make and declare this my last will and Testament in manner and form as follows (viz) I give I bequeath unto my wife Sally all of the personal estate which will be coming to me from my father's estate during of her natural life or widowhood.

Provided she should have an heir by me it my wish and desire that she should take care of ~~the~~ said property at her death or marriage. Should she die be the longest liver, I give and bequeath all of the said property to said child it is my wish that the crop should be continued and sold to pay my just debts. Item 2^d Provide my wife should not have an heir by me. I give and bequeath unto my sister Susan Martha & Sally Sharrad all of the land which will be coming to me from my father's estate to them and their heirs forever but should my wife have a child by me I give and bequeath the said land to the child if it should be a longer liver than either of my sisters, and if the child should die without heir for my sisters to have the land as soon given should either of my sisters die with out heir it is my wish that the surviving one should have the 2^d Land.

Item 3^d I give and bequeath unto my wife Sally her choice of my cows and furniture to her and her heirs forever, and the balance of my property not named I have to be sold. Should my wife die without an heir by me it is my wish the use of the property should be to my surviving Brothers and Sisters or their heirs forever. I do constitute and appoint John Dwyer my true and lawful Executor to this my last will & Testament in witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 19th day of May in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty one.

Item the first - I leave to my beloved wife Elizabeth the whole of my property that I now possess in my house and the whole of my negroes that shall be in my possession at the day of my death - also my stock of horses, mules and cattle, sheep and hogs - also the whole of my plantations situate together with the whole of my household and kitchen furniture, with the exception of four feather beds and furniture - this all above named to her during her widowhood.

Item the second, I give and bequeath to Henry Fittell one feather bed and furniture together with the sum of fifty dollars in Cash, this to her the said Henry and her heirs forever.

Item the third, after my wife's death or marriage, should she marry again then my will and devise is and do hereby give and bequeath to my beloved daughter in law Narcissa Brown the whole of my property of every description that have not been before her given away, this to her the said Narcissa and her heirs forever.

And lastly I appoint and ordain my worthy friends Edmund Jacobs Esq. and Paul Connor to be executors of this my last will testament made by me William G. Lawrence this the sixteenth day of August in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty one.
