

Lettitia Mason's Will

I Lettita Mason of the County of Northampton and State of North Carolina do make and ordain this my last will and testament as follows: I give to my four sons of living and if not to their heirs if any of them David A. Mason Thomas Mason Henry Mason and Benjamin Mason Twenty five cents each to be paid out of my estate and no more to them nor their heirs forever. I give to my four daughters of living and if not to their heirs if any of them Frances A. Harrison Elizabeth Mason formerly Nancy Mason and Martha S. Mason twenty five cents each to be paid out of my estate and no more to them nor their heirs forever. I have given to Martha S. Mason one feather bed which she may keep but no more of my estate.

I give to my friend Simpson R. Garrison all my negro man & woman wife by him by slaves by you and his wife Lydia & Mary making seven in all and their future increase to him and his heirs forever & also give to said Simpson R. Garrison all my goods bonds and accounts together with all other due to me in my household and kitchen furniture of any description & my stock of cattle, hogs, one white horse, two or nine head of cattle, one work oxen two cow-calfes and two yearlings and by hand of of hogs also my plantation utensils of any description whatever unto him the said Simpson R. Garrison and his heirs forever.

Fifth. I do nominate and appoint my said friend Simpson R. Garrison Executor to this my last will and testament. In witness whereof I do subscribe at my hand and seal the 29<sup>th</sup> day of April A.D. one thousand eight hundred and forty signed sealed and acknowledged

I Elisite Oliver of the County of Northampton and State of North Carolina be of last mind and memory but cast during the uncertainty of my earthly existence as made and entered this my last will and testament in manner and form as follows:

First that my Executor Thomas G. Powell

I give to my beloved grand son William C. Jenkins my bed and furniture and one desk and send it to his mother from my bed until he come of age. Item. I give to my beloved grandson James G. Powell my bed stripe looking and furniture and blue long painted chest and send to his father until he comes of age.

Item I give to my beloved grand daughter Sarah Jenkins my bed and furniture and my marble painted chest and send them to her mother until she becomes of age. Item. I give to my beloved daughter Lucy Jenkins the sum of five dollars cash and thus heirs forever and I leave my houses and lands to be sold and all of my other property now in my will and after paying of all of debts and expenses the remainder if any shall be equally divided among Williams Jenkins & James G. Powell & Sons Jenkins by my executors

and I do hereby appoint my trusty friend Thomas G. Powell my lawful Executor to all business and purpose to execute this my last will and testament according to the true intent and meaning of the same and very just and cause thereof to be my last will and testament was Obedient at my hand and to my test this the 1st May 1840

Thomas H. Richardson's Will

I Thomas H. Richardson of the County of Northampton and State of North Carolina was to make and ordain this my last will and desirous in manner and form as follows: 1<sup>st</sup>. My will and desire is that my Executor shall pay away my just debts out of my estate. 2<sup>nd</sup> I send to my Foster Hardy Richardson all my lumber and other materials all my stock of every kind whatsoever to his only

and not to be sold or taken for any debt that he may have or may hereafter contract or make. 3<sup>rd</sup> I tend to my Father Hardy Richard by letter prior to his death by my Executor for providing and clothing for him and if in the good judgment of my Executor the said debts shall not be sufficient for his support and clothing. By my last Executor there attest him more but, do I give or leave him a sum to be subject or taken in any way to pay his debts or for him to draw in any way from my Executor other than I may direct it is the true intent and meaning of this my last will and devise that of my said Father there be no executors or trustees may make it necessary that my Executor by out or before execute the whole of my said debts but for him to have good Judgment in the discharge of his duty.

4<sup>th</sup>: It is my will and desire that after my said Father Hardy Richard shall die that my executor shall sell at publick sale all the property so left above and the balance of the money paid to me to pay over to Thomas Braden Clark law of Mr. W. Clark. 5<sup>th</sup>: I give and bequeath to Thomas B. Clark law of Mr. W. Clark all the remaining part of my estate, after the death of my Father, but if the said Thomas B. Clark should die before he comes to be lawful age my wife and sonne or his my ~~sonne~~ sonne to have his equally divided between the surviving children of Philo & Clark now the wife of Mr. W. Clark.

6<sup>th</sup>: I nominate and appoint my Friend Samuel Harriss to my whole and sole Executor to this my last will and devise. To witness my hand and seal the 15<sup>th</sup> day of November 1849.

Clark who intends unto him in the penalty of two thousand dollars compensation & with Lienment Bonds of Henry H. Tracy secured

### Michael. Harris Will

In the name of god Amen I Michael Davis of Northampton County and State of Pennslyvania being in health and of sound mind and memory do make and ordain this my last will and testament in these manner and form following (To wit.) Item the 1<sup>st</sup>. my will and devise is that all my just debts be paid. Item the 2<sup>nd</sup> I leave unto my wife Elizabeth Davis all my property both real and personal during her natural life.

Item 3<sup>rd</sup>: After my wife death my will and devise is that my son Abraham Harris as here and see by these presents give unto him my Deed tract of Land that I purchased of Dempsey R. Harris bounded as follow Beginning on a black oak and holly tree on the south side of the road thence running a south course to a black gum in the moccasin swamp thence down the swamp to an ash in John Russells line thence up the said Russells line to a poplar a corner of said Russells and said Abraham Davis - thence up a branch to a post on the south side of the road thence up the road to the beginning - I also give him one work day that he has had in payment to him his hire and expenses forever.

Item the 4<sup>th</sup>: I give to my son John H. Harris my house tract of land beginning in Abraham Davis line a corner from in the moccasin swamp thence along his line a north course to a black oak and holly tree on the south side of the road. thence up the road to a mulberry tree on the north side of the road. Abraham Davis corner thence north to a walnut tree thence west to a red oak tree back to a large pine in the south line of the road thence south to a hickory tree in the head of a branch thence down the said branch to the moccasin swamp thence down the said swamp to the black gum at the beginning. I also give him my tobacco gin and still and first choice of my father beds and furniture with a hope that he will stay with his mother and take care of her during her life.

Item the 5<sup>th</sup>: I give and bequeath to son Hardy Harris the lands and of the lands I have given my son John H. Harris Beginning on his corner line at the road thence along his line to a laurel gum in the head of a branch, thence down the said branch to the moccasin swamp thence up the same to a small branch thence back up the said branch to 3 small maple in Dempsey R. Harris line thence along his line North to large black oak near the meeting House thence West along said Davis line to a tree thence north to the road thence East to the pine at the beginning. I also give him second choice of my beds and furniture.

Item the 6<sup>th</sup>: I give by these presents as ministrer and appoint my wife Elizabeth Harris
