Item I give and bequeath unto my grand daughter Annina Lafayette one hundred Dollars to she and her heirs forever.

Item My will and desire is that all my stock of horses and carted sheep hogs also all my Crop of Corn Tobacco Cotton plantation animals &c. Eggs Cakes shall be sold also all my household Kitchen furniture that is not mentioned before shall be sold to the highest bidder and the money arising from the sale to pay this Legacy given to Annina Lafayette and all my just debts also my will and desire is that all my negroes that not given away before shall be hired out until my son Harrison C. Lafayette comes to be twenty one years of age then the hire and negroes to be equally divided between all my children to wit, Persula, Susan, Tabitha Lafayette, Julia Lafayette, Persula Woodard, Harrison C. Lafayette, Charles Lafayette also the balance after paying my debts to be equally divided amongst the above named children.

And I do nominate and appoint my two Executors W. B. Lockhart and James M. Wood, he and sole Executors of this my last will and testament disannulling all other wills heretofore made by me as Witness my hand and seal this first day of August 1827.
