This last Will and Testament of Mary Lee deceased was exhibited in open Court and proved in due form of law by the oath of James Parrott one of the subscribing Witnesses thereto. Whereupon Isaac Wicks one of the Executors therein named qualified according to law, and ordered to be certified and recorded -
B. M. & C. Lockhart the other Exec. Teste John W. Hamlin Esq.
alleged to be at his Court 1826.

John Woods Will. In the name of God Amen I John Wood in County of Northampton being of sound and perfect mind and memory blessed be god for the same do this 24th day of May in the year our Lord 1826 make and publish this my last will and testament in manner following that is to say my will and desire is that all my negroes and all my property of all kinds or describ and without describ shall be sold and the money arising from the sale of the said property shall be equally divided between my beloved wife Mary Wood and my son James B. Wood and my son John Wood, there is one Bond that came by my wife to the amount of Five hundred Dollars it is my Will that my wife shall have that Bond in her part. I give the above named property to the above named persons to them and their all forever. I do hereby make my worthy friend James H. Wood my hol and sole Executor of this my last Will and testament do annihilate all others. sicut in the presence of us the day and date above written -

Nathampton County September Court 1826.

The paper writing purporting to be the last Will and Testament of John Wood deceased was presented in open Court and proved in the following manner to me by the oath of Jackson Martin who states that he was called on by the said John Wood to write his will and that he the said Jackson wrote it agreeably to his request & direction and that the said John Wood was in his proper mind at the time of making such request - Whereupon James H. Wood the Executor therein named qualified as the law directs - and ordered to be certified and recorded.

with Molen James in his last illness and until his death that the deceased
said to him the said Bradley he the deceased wished his children to have
the whole of his Estate except his mare and her he wished Mr or Mrs
Cobbard his widow which of them said Bradley did not perfectly understand

as the deceased was much exhausted and died in a few moments afterwards - The said Bradley further states that the deceased was perfectly aware when he arrived at the place where he lay sick and continued to until his death -

Gray Palmer's Will. In the name of god Amen Gray Palmer of the County of Northampton and state of North Carolina in a low state of health but in perfect mind and memory do make and ordain this to be my last will and testament in manner and form as following to wit - I first bequeath unto my dear beloved wife Polly Palmer all my property consisting of slaves stock of every kind and negroes household & kitchen furniture all to remain together on the plantation during her widowhood or natural life except the property that I may leave to be sold one of my wife Polly should get. and then my will is that the whole of my property should be equally divided between her and Mary Palmer and Martha Palmer if she should not then at her death my will and desire is that all the property I now own should be equally divided between Mary Palmer and Martha Palmer my daughters. Sales wish of any negro for money that my Executor should sell Charles and Sidney for the best price that can be got and if there should be no necessity for money then let the said negroes remain as before stated. I nominate my friend Noah Edmon who sole and executor to this my last will and testament. In witness I have hereunto set my hand and seal October 15th 1826.

Whereupon administration of the will annexed is granted Mary Palmer, who entered into bond with William Gay and Green Gay ^{sureties} in the sum of One thousand dollars conditioned as the law directs &c. and ordered to be certified and recorded.
