In the name of God Amen I John Wood a County of Northampton being of sound and perfect mind and memory blessed be god for the same do this 24th day of May in the year our Lord 1826 make and publish this my last will and testament in manner following that is to say my will and desire is that all my negroes and all my property of all kind or kind and without kind shall be sold and the money arising from the sale of the said property shall be equally divided between my beloved Wife Mary Wood and my son James B. Wood and my son John Wood, then is on them that come by my wife to the amount of Five hundred Dollars and it is my Will that my wife shall have that sum in her part. I give the above named property to the above named persons to them and their and forever. I do hereby make my worthy friend James B. Wood my sole and sole Executor of this my last Will and testament do annulling all others. Witness in the presence of us the day and date above Written -

Northampton County September Court 1826-

This paper Writing purporting to be the last Will and Testament of John Wood deceased was presented in open Court and proved in the following manner to wit by the oath of Jacobus Hinton who states that he was called on by the said John Wood to make his Will and that he the said Hinton made it agreeably to his request & directions and that the said John Wood was in his proper mind at the time of making such request. Gray Balmer's Will. In the name of god Amen I Gray Balmer of the County of Northampton and state of North Carolina in a low state of health put in perfect mind and memory do make and ordain this to be my last will and testament in manner and form as following to wit -

First I bind unto my dear beloved wife Sally Balmer all my property consisting of slaves stock of every kind and negroes household & kitchen furniture all to remain together on the plantation during her widowhood or natural life except the property that I may leave to be sold and if my wife Sally should get married then my will is that the whole of my property should be equally divided between her and Mary Balmer and Martha Balmer if she should out then at her death my will and desire is that all the properties I now own should be equally divided between Mary Balmer and Martha Balmer my daughters. Sales such of my negroes for money that my Executor should sell Charles and Sidney for the best price that can be got and if there should be no necessity for money then let the said negroes remain as before stated. I nominate my friend Noah Colson whole

sole and executor to this my last will and testament. In Witness

This last Will and Testament of Gray Balmer deceased was exhibited in open Court and proved in due form of law by the oath of Allen Barkley one of the subscribing Witnesses thereto. Noah Colson the Executor there named refused to qualify. Whereupon administration was the will annexed is granted Mary Balmer, who entered into Bond with William Gay and Green Gay in the penal sum of Ten thousand dollars conditioned as the law directs - &c. and ordered to be certified and recorded.
