 is to have three portions more than a Child's part, my Son
 John is to have my best Coat and Waistcoat and a Coverlet more
 than a Child's Part my Son James a Child's Part
 my Daughter Margret a Child's part and my Daughter
 Mary one Shilling Sterling and I so constitute and bequeath
 William and John above named my Lawfull Executors
 and I so hereby utterly disallow and revoke all former Wills
 by me made Ratifying and Confirming this and nothing
 to be my last Will and Testament, In witness whereof I
 have hereunto set my hand and Seal the day and
 above Written Signe Seal Publick and Pronounced to be
 the last Will of the said John Trousdale in the presence of
