In the name of God Amen I being Daniel of the County of
Person and State of North Carolina, single and whole in body
but of sound & perfect mind & memory, hereby do solemnly
swear, and bind myself to mind the Malady of my body, &
knowing that it is appointed for all men to die, to make &
ordain this my last Will & Testament. That is to say, I hereby
and do of all I recommend my soul into the hands of Almighty
God who gave it, and my body to be buried in a decent Christian
like manner at the discretion of my Executors hereafter named
Nothing doubting but at the general Resurrection I shall receive
the same, again by the mighty Power of God, and as touching
such worldly Estate whereunto I doth bequeath God to keep
me unto in this life. Give, Divide, & dispose of in the
following manner & form, that I do hereby say
I bequeath it is my will & desire that as my last Duties
be paid
I do hereby bequeath unto my Well beloved son John Daniel
one half of the land whereon I now live on the East side
to be divided from the other half by a line running
North & South through the Tracts. One Negro Man named Tom
One Horse named Castle & one Tree the Red and Furniture
the land contains by Colonization One Hundred Acres
to him & his heirs & assigns forever
I do hereby bequeath unto my Well beloved son Daniel
the other half of the land whereon I now live, which is
divided from his Brother John's part by a North and South
line lying on the West side beginning at the corner
line dividing the house I now live in containing by
