I James Whittle of the County and State aforesaid
 being seck in Body but in sound mind and memory do make
 and declare this my last Will and Testament in Manner and
 form as follows, that that all my last debts shall be paid I do now
 give and devise of the Balance of my Estate as follows to wit
 I give my loving Wife Nancy Whittle fifty Acres of Land
 whereon I now live including the dwelling House and all the out
 houses, with the Orchard to be laid off so as not to injure the balance
 of the Plantation more than necessary, also a Negro Woman named
 Pearly and a Negro Boy named Alie during his Natural life time a
 Widowhood and also two feather Beds and furniture, one Chest with
 Drawers, also all the Kitchen furniture with all the Dressing furniture
 of the Dwelling House the Young Mare and Colt with Farming Tools
 sufficient for two hands, to work with, in the farm, also the Smiths
 Tools and Wagon to the use of the family on the plantation to her the
 same as to my sons also her Choice of three head of Cows and Calves
 ten head of Hogs that was about home and her Choice of three
 Ewes one Flax Wheel and one Rag Wheel, one pair of Cotton Gears
 and one pair of Wood Gears, all the Leather or haws to the use of
 the family on the plantation also a sufficient quantity of Grain
 and provisions for her self and Stock for one Year, also all the
 Hogsheads and Barrels belonging to the Larder Room, also the Horse
 known by the name of Pompey, and also one hundred Dollars in
 Cash to her, but notwithstanding if she Marries to be cut out of the whole
 and I Will that the whole of the above mentioned property

not otherwise disposed of be equally divided between my two Sons John and James
 Whittle but should also remain single to have the disposal of all at her own will
 to whom she pleases, so that it is within the limits of my knowledge, then I give
 and bequeath to my Son William Whittle five Shillings, then I give and
 bequeath my Land to my two Sons John and James Whittle share and share alike
 according to quality but after the death or Marriage of my Wife Nancy my
 Will is that my Son John Whittle shall have the best including the buildings
 now occupied by myself with the Orchard to him their heirs and assigns forever
 then I give and bequeath to my Son John Whittle one Negro Boy named
 Elijah and one other named John, also one John and the above named
 Pearly after the Death or Marriage of my Wife Nancy to him his heirs or
 assigns for ever also one Loric Mare two Cows and Calves, two Boars
 of Irish his choice and one Pig, one Bee, one Mattcock and one Cow one
 Feather Bed, one Bed Linen, also one Tow and Pegs then I give and
 bequeath to my son James Whittle three Negro Boys known by name Elias,
 Wade and Thresh, also one Negro Woman named Niny to him and his
 heirs and assigns for ever, also one Pig, one Cow and Colt, two head of
 Sheep, her Choice, one Bed Linen, one Pig, one Bee, one Mattcock, one Bee, one
 Feather Bed, also one Tow and Pegs then I give and bequeath to my four
 Grand Children Children of my Daughter Nancy Pearly the three Daughters
 fifty Cents each, to my Grand Son James Pearly I give three hundred Dollars
 then I give and bequeath to my Daughter Sarah Pearly Wife of John
 Pearly three hundred Dollars then I give and bequeath to my
 Daughter Pearly Pearly Wife of John Pearly one Negro Woman
 named Leahy and a Negro Boy named Dick after the death or
 Marriage of my Wife Nancy, also a Mulatto Girl named Mary
 to her and her heirs or assigns for ever then I give to and
 bequeath to my Daughter Dora the Gardner Wife of John Gardner
 one Negro Boy named Nathan and one named Anderson to
 her and her heirs and assigns for ever then I give and
 bequeath to my Daughter Mary Beble Wife of Emanuel Beble
 one Negro Boy named Brown, and one Negro Girl named Jimmy
 to her and her heirs and assigns forever, also a Black Filly of two
 Years old, and also after the Death of my Wife Nancy the Loric Mare
 then I Will that all the balance of my Stock of Hogs go to the use of
 the family on the plantation, also the Crops on hand and what is
 growing also to the use of the family on the farm then I Will that
 after the death of my Wife Nancy my Smith Tools and Wagon and
 Cows to my Son John Whittle then I Will that all the balance
 of my Stock and all other property that is not disposed of in this Will
 shall be made sale of to the highest bidder by my Executors
