First, I give my loving Wife Nancy Whittle forty Acres of Land
whereon I now live including the dwelling House and all the out
Buildings with the Accretions to be laid off so as not to injure the balance
of the Plantation more than necessary, also a Negro Woman named
Daisy and Negro Boy named Dick during her Natural life time or
widowhood and also two feather Beds and furniture one Chest and
Drawers, also all the kitchen furniture with all the Dishes, Pots and
Pans of the Dwelling House the Young Slave and all with farming Tools
Sufficient for two hands, to work with in the field, also the Smaller
Tools and Waggon to the use of the family on the plantation to her the
same as to my Sons also her Choice of three head of Cows and Calves
ten head of Dogs that uses about home and her Choice of three
Ears of Flax Wheel and one Big Wheel, an ear of Cotton Goss and
one pair of Wool Goss, all the Leather or hams to the use of
the family on the plantation also a sufficient quantity of Grain
and Corn meal for her self and Stock for One Year, also all the
Stockheads and Barrels belonging to the Cedar House, also the house
known by the Name of Pompey, and also an hundred Dollars in
Cash to her, but notwithstanding of the Marriage to be cut out of the whole
I Will that the whole of the above mentioned property

not otherwise in force of be equally divided between my Two Sons John and James
Whittle but should the Remainder happen to have the value of all at his death
to have the same, so that it is within the limits of my Faculty, then I give
and bequeath to my Son William Whittle for Selling or Rent, I give and

Feather Bed, One Little Girl, also One Cow and Pig - then, I give and
bequeath to my son James Whittle Three Negro Boys known by Name Peter,
Mark and Joseph, also One Negro Woman named Nancy to him and his
heirs and assigns for ever, also One Boy Horse, One Cow and Calf, Two Head of
Sheep, her Choice, One Little Girl, One Cow, One Heifer, One Stotck, One Sheep, One
Feather Bed, also One Cow and Pig - then, I give and bequeath to my four
Grand Children Children of my Daughter Nancy Brady the three daughters
fifty Quarters each, to my Grand Son James Brady I give Three Hundred Dollars.
Then, I give and bequeath to my Daughter Sarah Brady Wife of James
Brady Three Hundred Dollars - then, I give and bequeath to my
Daughter Belinda Brady Wife of John Brady One Negro Woman
named Sally and a Negro Boy named Dick after the death or
Marriage of my Wife Nancy, also a Mulatto Girl named Mary
to her and her heirs and assigns for ever - then, I give and
bequeath to my Daughter Dorothy Gardner Wife of John Gardner
One Negro Boy named Nathan and one named Andrew to
her and her heirs and assigns for ever - then, I give and
