It is my will that my Executor purchase the three articles named as before and pay them, which I hope they will accept, as a token of the love & esteem I have for them. I award my Brother John Harper to be the Executor of the mutual Will of himself and of his wife named and appoint him for that purpose, he having therof the sole right after his death my test. will & Testament set my hand thereat, witness and seal by his seal, sealed, published and declared to the said Trustees after the publication of his last will & Testament in the presence of us who were present at the time of signing

Fifty Dollars. I leave unto my son Robert Moffett one covered blue border
