To all whom these presents shall come, know ye that I Nathan Elliott of the County of Randolph and State of North Carolina, being in a low State of Health, but of a sound mind and memory thinks it needful to make this my last Will and Testament which are as follows, after paying my last debts, I give unto my Grand Daughter Polly Elliott (Daughter of James Elliott on Tract or parcel of Land lying on the East side of Town Creek, and on the South side of the Salisbury Road to her and the heirs of her body forever, James Elliott my Son shall have the use of the said Land for the Term of Eight Years also, I give unto my Son James Elliott all the remaining part of my Land to him and his heirs forever, except the House and Lot where I now live. I leave to Mary the Woman that lives with me to her and her heirs for life time or as long as she lives as I leave her, also I give to the said Mary one Cow and Calf to be at her disposal, I also give to my two Daughters viz Mary Raport and Elizabeth Webb fifty Dollars to each all the Rest of my property both real and personal I give unto my Son James Elliott in a recompense to take care of his Mother as long as she lives to him and his heirs forever, and lastly I nominate and appoint my

son James Elliott Executor to this my last Will and Testament to be the same faithful and performed as above directed, I do hereby affirm this to be my last Will and Testament in Witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 26th day of July 1824 in the County of
