In the name of God Amen - I Samuel Martin of the County of Randolph and State of North Carolina being advanced in Years and of sound mind and sound memory and knowing that a general to the common sense of nature my time in this World cannot be long to make this my last Will and Testament in presence and view of my friends - First - I Will and direct that my body shall be decently buried, and all my just debts and funeral expenses be paid by my Executors herein after named, Secondly I give bequeath unto my beloved Wife Minnie Martin a sufficient and comfortable support out of my real and Personal Estate for and during her life, if she should survive my death with the privilege of visiting out my Estate in that part of my Parish Samuel Edwards should not live with and provide for her as intended by this Will, but in case my said Wife should die, I then give and bequeath to her only one half of my personal property - Thirdly - I give and bequeath to her and unto my Nephew Samuel Edwards (son of Samuel Edwards) who now lives with me, and has for several Years been and in great services and assistance all my personal property and real Estate reserving a life time right or comfortable support out of the same for my Wife provided she lives single but in case she should marry then I give to the said Samuel Edwards, one half of all my personal Estate, and what is hereafter otherwise bequeathed and assigns to him the whole of my real Estate - It is further to be understood that the intention of this Will is, that during the life of my said Wife Minnie Martin, her and my said Nephew shall live together on my Estate and jointly hold, enjoy and look together my property as far as is practicable during her life or widowhood as the case may be so that she may be sure of a comfortable support, and that in the case Samuel Edwards may have the whole that is left after her death or what is hereby intended for him in case of her marriage - Fourthly I give and bequeath to Son Francis Ben Barber, and to her son Erich Francis I give and bequeath my Great Coat, and Dress - I do hereby nominate constitute and appoint my beloved Wife Minnie Martin and my Nephew Samuel Edwards Executors of this my last Will and
