

I have and bequeath unto my son John Bulla the Tavern house and lot which I bought from John Black and also the House and lot purchased by me from Thomas Dutton One hundred Acres of Land lying South from the Crop Land which I purchased from John Black and also the plantation I purchased from Joseph Brown with all their Covenants & improvements to him his heirs and assigns for ever he having unto my son John Bulla One hundred Dollars

I have and bequeath unto my son John Bulla the above named One hundred Dollars which is to be paid to him by his Brother Isaac and after my decease and all the time I have by purchase with the South Green plantation and one half of Smith's Dock and three acres of Colver all which I will to him his heirs & assigns I have and bequeath unto my Daughter Sally Taylor forty pounds five pence of which it is my will and desire shall be paid half by each of his Brothers out of what I have left them I have and bequeath unto my Daughter Betsy Bulla forty pounds to be paid half by her Brothers five pounds each out of the property I have left them

I will and bequeath unto my son Daniel Bulla the Irish Bulla my old home plantation on back tenack with all the Stock Tools and furniture which I have left my wife to be equally divided between them at the end of my wife's life or widowhood I also have unto them my still and stands with all the Goods thereunto belonging to be held equally between them - I likewise have and bequeath unto my said son Daniel and Irish one hundred Acres of land including the fork of the Quaker and Grating roads and also one hundred Acre or thereabouts adjoining the plantation on the South

East to be equally divided between Daniel & Irish & to be held by them their heirs & assigns for ever

It is my will and desire that my three Negroes Bet Long & Morning in case of my death be delivered over to Isaac Gray (agreeable to a Contract which on this day have made) which is as follows Viz: The said Gray is to have said Negroes for Eight Hundred and Forty Dollars out of which sum what Isaac Gray is to be deducted and he is to pay yearly unto my Executors the sum of two Hundred Dollars until the whole is paid

It is my will and desire that the money coming from the Negroes be immediately in the above sum shall be paid to Isaac Gray and he to have and keep as he likes

I do nominate, constitute and appoint my son Isaac Bulla my son Daniel Bulla Isaac Bulla & John Bulla Executors of my last will and Testament in which whereof I have deceased I am dead I do this 11th day of November Anno Domini 1808

Codical.  Will which relates to my Wife Sister ~~Willa~~ & do here
 leave and bequeath unto my said Wife the use of my
 House on Park Creek & four acres of land adjoining there-
 to including the Orchard I also give her one horse my
 riding Chair two of my best Cows & two of my best
 feather beds as much of my Kitchen furniture as is judged
 necessary for her one cow and pigs & twelve Dollars
 a year to be paid out of the profits of my plantation
 all which I give to her during her life or Widowhood
 & no longer it is further my Will that such provisions
 as are at present on hand shall go toward the support
 of my wife and Children & should there be a surplus
 it is my Will that it be sold by my Executors or
 Codicil whereof I have unto this Codicil set my hand
 and seal the 16th day of January Anno Domini 1809
