In the name of God amen I Mary Smith of the County of Rockingham and state of North Carolina being weak of body but preserving some mind and as poor memory and being anxious to settle all my worldly affairs while the Lord in his mercy helps me with strength of mind sufficient for the important task to make and renew this my last will and testament hereby revoking all former wills by me made.

Item 1<sup>st</sup> I loan to my beloved daughter Nancy Hall during her natural life one feather bed and furniture which I bought of her and at the death of my said daughter Nancy it is my will and desire that the bed and furniture thus loaned to her be given to her son Daniel and his heirs forever.

Item 2<sup>nd</sup> after my death I give to my daughter Nancy one fine chest to her and her heirs forever.

Item 3<sup>d</sup> I give to my son William Smith and my daughter Nancy Hall one piece of blue and white cotton cloth to be equally divided between them Item 4<sup>th</sup> after my death I give to my beloved daughter Polly Griffeth my side saddle to her and her heirs forever.

Item 5<sup>th</sup> in my death I give to my two daughters Polly Griffeth and Nancy Hall all my wearing apparel to be equally divided between them Item 6<sup>th</sup> I appoint my son William Smith Executor to this my last will and testament in which whereof I have hereunto set my hand and affixed my seal the 9<sup>th</sup> day of March 1826 signed a sealed and delivered in presence of us John Griffith and

In the name of God amen I Michael Thomas of Rockingham County and State of North Carolina this 3<sup>rd</sup> day of December 1816 being weak in body but of perfect mind and memory thanks be given to God for the same calling to mind the mortality of my body and that it is appointed for all men once to die and make and renew this my last will and testament that is to say principally and first of all I give and recommend my soul to God Almighty that gave it and my body to the earth to be decently buried at the discretion of my executors nothing doubting but I shall meet the same again at the general resurrection of the dead by the mighty power of God and as touching such mortality of mine as God has pleased to bestow me with in life I give away and bequeath in manner and form viz

1<sup>st</sup> I give and bequeath unto my beloved wife during her natural life the plantation wherein we now live on being the same I bought of James Pollock with all the improvements known also thirty acres of the tract bought of Smith and Simon beginning at the north east corner to
