I give and bequeath the rest of all my negroes to my daughter Lucy Kolderby and her heirs for ever in testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand this 15th day of September in the year of our Lord 1816

 First I desire that all my Just debts and Funeral charges be paid
 Secondly I Give and bequeath unto my dear and Beloved ^{wife} ^{one} ~~and~~ Red & no haired cherry one Bay mare banded ears all her teeth of the tracks of land I now live on she is also to have the use of the household furniture now belonging to ~~my~~ ^{my} ~~estate~~ ^{estate} during life
 I give unto my daughter Dean Duncan twenty shillings to her her heirs ^{and assigns} for ever
 I do give unto my son William Birmingham this tract of land I now live on lying on Troublesome Creek in the County of Rockingham. Elizabeth Birmingham my wife having her thirds during her life also two head of horses eleven head of cattle seven sheep and nine hogs also the farming & outinances to him his heirs and assigns for ever
