

Wills January Court 1831.

In the name of God Amen. I George Watson of the County of Rutherford and State of North Carolina being weak in body but of perfect mind & memory thank to God, calling to mind the mortality of my body and knowing it is appointed for all men one to die, do make and ordain this my last Will and Testament, that is to say, principally and first of all I leave and recommend my soul to God into the hand of God that gave it, and my body I recommend to the Earth to be buried at the discretion of my executor - First of all my lawful debts to be paid, if any - 2<sup>nd</sup> I leave and bequeath to my brother William Watson ten dollars -

3<sup>rd</sup> I leave & bequeath to my brother Hugh Watson ten dollars - 4<sup>th</sup> I leave & bequeath to my sister Elizabeth Getty ten dollars - 5<sup>th</sup> I leave and bequeath to my sister Sabilla Sims ten dollars - 6<sup>th</sup> I leave and bequeath all the remainder of my Chattel property after the above named forty dollars is paid, to my brother Jane Watson & my Sister Eliza M. Watson to be equally divided between them the above named two - 7<sup>th</sup> I leave and bequeath to my brother James Watson all my right and interest in the land - I appoint, constitute, make & ordain my friend Hugh Watson Jr. my executor for this my last will & testament, and I do hereby ratify & confirm this done but this to be my last will and testament. In witness whereof I have hereunto put my hand and seal this seventeenth day of August one thousand eight hundred & thirty -

I William H. Clark of the County of Rutherford and State aforesaid, being of sound mind and memory (blessed be Almighty God for the same) yet weak in body & much afflicted, and knowing the uncertainty of life and that it is appointed for all men alike to die, do therefore make and direct the following disposition of my worldly goods after death. In the first place it is my will & desire that all my lawful debts shall be paid out of my estate.

In the next place I will & bequeath unto my beloved wife Catharine Kerr all that marriage or tenement of land of one hundred and fifty acres more or less lying and being in said County on the South side of Main Broad River joining therewith Elias Lynch & William Pucker together with all the house holds furniture, horses cattle, and stock of every kind and the negro woman with her increase together with all the outstanding debts all of which I wish her to have the entire use and benefit of until her death or until she marries then let which may happen it is my will and desire that the whole of my estate both real and personal shall be equally divided amongst the children and the mother in case she should marry it is further my desire and will that my wife Catharine and my executor shall give to either, and all or each of the children as they term at proper age or marriage so much of the estate as they think best to spare, not exceeding the amount given to my daughter that married whom aforesaid and that the said Norman Linck will consider the amount given as so much paid in her part of said estate -

In witness of all which I have done, I do besides nominate my beloved wife Catharine Kerr

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executrix and Henry & Kerr executors  
to this my last will and testament.—

April Court 1831.—

In the name of God, Amen.

Being in a low state of body but in perfect  
mind and memory and considering the frailty of  
man I make this my last will & testament:

1<sup>st</sup> I leave my body to the dust & my soul to God that gave it  
2<sup>nd</sup> Funeral Charges and all just debts to be paid

3<sup>rd</sup> I give and bequeath to Robert Cockran s.w. twenty dollars  
which I have left to the said Cockran, also the balance  
of one forty dollar note on William Ervin after my  
debts and funeral charges and twenty dollars to  
James Gaffey, one Cow and Calf, ten yards of  
Flax Cloth, two Scythes and Cradles, one side of  
soal leather.—

4<sup>th</sup> I give and bequeath to James Gaffey son of John  
Gaffey twenty dollars out of a forty dollar note on William  
Ervin, one two year old heifer, one axe, one frow, all  
my leather only one side. To this my last will and  
testament I appoint Robert Cockran s.w. and James  
Gaffey son of John executors, this 24<sup>th</sup> day of  
March 1831.

Wills — July Court 1831.—

In the name of God, Amen.

I Martin S. Elliott of Puttengood County and  
State of N. Carolina being very infirm in body but sound  
in mind and memory do ordain this my last will and  
testament.— Item. I give and recommend my soul  
into the hands of Almighty God and my body to the  
ground to be buried in a Christianlike manner—

Item.— It is my will and desire that my executrix  
hereafter named shall pay all my just debts—

Item. I give unto my beloved wife Nancy Elliott  
my tract of land wherein I now reside, also my fam-  
ily of ~~negroes~~, (trunk) Tom, Ellick, Simon, Patty, Rebecca  
and her child Erasmus and all the menage of said  
negro, all of which I give to her during her natural  
life or widowhood, and after her death or marriage  
it is my will and desire that the whole of my property  
should be sold to the highest bidder, according to law  
and the money arising therefrom to be equally divided  
between my beloved wife Nancy Elliott and her eight  
children, namely Thomas F. Elliott, Albert S. Elliott  
Ainsly S. Elliott, Sidney Hamilton Elliott, Pamela Ann  
Lee Elliott, Esby A. Elliott, Sarahus A. C. Elliott &  
Parthena Elizabeth Elliott each to share and share alike.

Item. I also give to my beloved wife Nancy Elliott  
all my household and kitchen furniture also all my  
stock of every description, consisting of horses, cows,  
sheep and hogs, and all the plantation tools of every  
description all of which I give to her during her natural  
life or widowhood, and after her death or marriage  
it is my will and desire that the whole of the property  
named be sold according to law and the proceeds to be  
equally divided between my beloved wife Nancy Elliott  
and her children before named.—
