I Thomas Goode of the County of Stokes in the State of North Carolina being at present of sound & perfect mind & memory but weak in body in this tenth day of January in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred & twenty five make & publish this my last will & testament in manner & form as follows, to wit:

First of all I recommend my soul unto the hand of Almighty God who gave it & my body to the dust from whence it came to be buried in a Christian like manner at the discretion of my Executors hereinafter named: and as touching such worldly estate where with it has pleased God to bless me in this life I give & bequeath the same in the following manner & form First. That all my just debts if any I shall owe at the day of my death shall be paid out of my estate. — 2nd. I only give & bequeath unto my daughter Polly (& her children) who intermarried to WestleyLean one dollar only to be their full share or divided of my estate, over & above what they have already received of me as

3rd. It is my will & desire that my negro woman slave Lucy at the day of my death shall be set at liberty & free by his giving security for her good behaviour, this is my will & will as said negro slave has behaved herself faithful in taking care of me as my house keeper in my old age etc.

4th. I give & bequeath the whole of the remaining part of my estate both real & personal which I may die seized & possessed of at the day of my death to my two grand sons Thomas & William Goode & their heirs forever they being the children of my son Henry Goode and to be divided there & then alike — 5th & lastly. I nominate ordain & appoint my brother William Goode & Charles Branner Executors of this my last will & testament. In witness whereof the said Thomas Goode hath hereunto set his hand & affixed his seal the day & year first above written.

I Henry Harth being sick & languishing but of sound mind & memory and casting to mind the mortality of my body & knowing that it is ordained for all men once to die do make ordain & appoint this my last will and testament revoking all other will or wills by me heretofore made.

Item the first. I will that my body be decently buried at the discretion of my Executors, & as to worldly goods wherewith it has pleased God to bless me with I will & request that be disposed of in the following manner —

First. I will that all my goods & all he had out of the part of my estate that my Executors thinks can be best spared, without discommodeing my wife & small children —

Item 2d. I will that my wife Franky Harth have all my estate both real & personal to use & dispose of at her discretion for the benefit of all my children, & to aid her in raising & educating of those that she thinks require it —

Item 3d. I will that my boy's have the use a riding — & working my land & making crops on it for themselves as long as they stay with their mother & if their mother & three of my children that are of age shant wish the land sold, I will that my Executors sell it to the best advantage of all my children, & at the death of my wife I will that what estate she has then, shall be equally divided between & among my beloved children namely: Nancy, Franky, Martin, John, Martha C. Floyd, Hambleton, Henry & Thomas, my landed estate being small & not suitable to divide in that many lots I will that it be sold as before stated & the proceeds equally divided at the death of my wife & I also appoint my beloved wife Executor & my son Franky Harth Executor of this my last will & testament.
