furniture and my loom and tauling Item and bequath to my son inlaw
John Cumming my still and the remmauning part of my worldly Estate,
Item it is my will that it be Equally divided amongst my four Daughters
(to wit, Jean Cumming, Mary Lister, Matthew Cunningham and Elizabeth
M^o Dugton, and I do make constitude and appoint my son inlaw John
Cumming my Executor of this my last will and testament likewise, I herewit
my own clothing to my daughter Jean Cumming to dispose of to whom she
may please, Item it my will and desire that in case either of me four said
Daughters should be left a widow that they should be entituled to their above
named property as their own right and title to dispose it at there pleasure,
whereunto I have set my hand this 9th day one thousand seven hundred
