the said land when sold to her and her heirs forever.

I give to my son James Boon one negro fellow named Spin
to him and his heirs forever.

I give to my daughter Mary Boon one negro girl named
Bager and ^{one} feather bed and one ten pound horse to be raised
out the sale of the above said land to her and her heirs forever.

I give to my son Daniel Boon one negro girl named
Vilate and one feather bed & one gray colt which is called
prock to him and his heirs forever.

My will and desire is that the land which I live should
be sold after my decease and the money arise from such
sale I give to my son Daniel only what I have will out
of it to three of my daughters to him and his heirs forever.

My will I desire that all that I give to my wife during
life that after her decease be sold and equally divided between
