 Bateman one hundred and thirty acres of land, the  
 tract whereon I now live, as to include my Mansions  
 house and all outbuildings and other improvements.  
 Also twenty five acres of the Oliver land lying on the  
 Old Swamp Road. To have and to hold to her the said  
 Sarah R Bateman for and during the term of her natural  
 life. And all my personal property consisting of household  
 and kitchen furniture, farming utensils, teams and stock  
 of all kinds, crops growing or matured and all personal  
 property on hand at my death; To have and to hold to her  
 the said Sarah R Bateman for and during the term  
 of her natural life;  
 Item I give and devise to my oldest son James J. Bateman  
 the tract of land whereon I now live (after the death  
 of my wife Sarah R Bateman) bounded as follows,  
 beginning in the Old Davis corner a pine stump adjoining  
 H. P. Phelps and W. A. Spruill, running west along the  
 Old Bateman line to the divided line between myself  
 and J. B. Davenport thence South along the divided line  
 to the foot of Jordan M. Phelps road, thence the various  
 courses of my land around to the first station. Also  
 twenty five acres of the Oliver land lying on the Old  
 Swamp Road. To have and to hold to him the said  
 James J. Bateman during the term of his natural life,  
 then to his children if he has any living, if not to go  
 to Mary Holmes and Harriett Holmes' children  
 Item I give and devise to my son Thomas B. Bateman  
 five dollars cash  
 Item I give and devise to Caroline Pitts children. One  
 dollar apiece  
 Item My will devise is that at the death of my beloved  
 wife Sarah R Bateman, all my personal property be  
 equally divided between my three children James J.  
 Bateman, Mary Holmes, and Harriett Holmes  
 Item My will devise is that all my lawful debts, and  
 my burial expenses be paid out of my personal prop-  
 erty -

And lastly I do hereby constitute and appoint my son James I Bateman and my beloved wife Sarah A Bateman my lawful executors to all intents and purposes to execute this my Last Will and Testament according to the true intent and meaning of the same, and every part and clause thereof; hereby revoking and declaring utterly void all other Wills and Testaments by me hereto before made
