I John Everett, being of sound mind, not
knowing at what time death may occur, doth
make this my last will and testament.

First:- I give and bequeath unto my son Nathan I.
Everett at my death the land where he now
lives containing fifty acres, more or less, I also
further give unto him one-half of my carpenter
tools to be equally divided by some one who
knows the use of carpenter's tools that him
and my son-in-law John D. Gregory can
choose Gregory being allowed first choice and
to keep the rest.

Second:- I give and bequeath to my daughter, Harriet
J. Gregory and her husband John D. Gregory, at
my death the land where I now live containing
more fifty acres more or less and I further give
unto them all of my chattels, property consisting
of horses, cattle, hogs, household and kitchen
furniture and cart, cart and plow harness, cows
and fodder and every species of farming uten-
sils of every description.

Third:- That they Harriett J. Gregory and husband,
John D. Gregory, should we or any one of us
become invalids so that we or either one of us
cannot support ourselves that they shall well
and faithfully take care of us until death.
