

Plymouth, N.C., Sept. 26th, 1910.

I, H. H. Hampton, being in sound mind, make this my last will. I give my son H. R. Hampton my Hatteras and Stacks Fisheries, with all the lands belonging thereto, also all the boats, skiffs, stumps, and everything I use in my fishing operations. I give my son H. R. Hampton, all my stores, ware-houses of every kind which I use in my mercantile business in the town of Plymouth, N.C., also all stores of merchandise of every description and all crop lands, and all bank accounts due me for this year's business, also my Fifty Seven shares of stock of Bank of Plymouth, also all money in Bank of Plymouth, due or may be due me from sales of stock of said bank, on certain conditions, the said H. R. Hampton, is to pay all my debts and liabilities, notes of every kind and the said H. R. Hampton is to pay my daughter Clara B. Hampton, Five Thousand Dollars out of book collections on January 1st, 1911.

I give to my daughter Clara B. Hampton the Five Thousand Dollars which comes from her brother H. R. Hampton. I give my daughter Clara B. Hampton my Chisoon Farm and Grand Island including all trees and every thing of every description belonging thereto. Also my two Berry Farms in Martin County including all trees and everything belonging thereto. She is to receive all rents coming from Chisoon and Berry farms for this year, also the farm where Andy Lewis lives known as part of Nelson land. I also give to my daughter Clara B. Hampton the J. L. Satterthwaite notes and mortgages also D. F. Salaman notes, and mortgages and A. T. Littleton notes and mortgages also the Eight Hundred Dollars note of J. H. Luge, also the Beasley Oliver notes and mortgages, the J. J. Hopkins notes and mortgage also the Four lots in the town of Plymouth, known as the Beasley lot on Hatteras Street. I give my daughter Clara B. Hampton my Thirty Shares of Stock of Norfolk National Bank also my Fifty Shares of Seaboard Bank, also my Twenty Five Shares of Mercantile Bank, all of Norfolk, Va.

I give my wife Loula M. Hampton, all my town property including furniture and everything pertaining thereto except what already has gone to H. R. Hampton and Clara B. Hampton. I give to my wife Loula M. Hampton Ten Thousand Dollars of Northern Pacific Bonds, also Twenty Thousand

Dollars of United Railway Bonds, also Five Thousand Dollars of Atlantic Trust Stock of Norfolk Va. I give to my wife Loula M. Hampton the H. L. Harrison mortgage, also notes and accounts due me from Warren Ambrose estate, also all notes and lands of every kind not already given to my two children, also I appoint my wife Loula M. Hampton Executrix to my will without bond, also I appoint my wife Loula M. Hampton Guardian to my daughter Clara B. Hampton, without bond.

I, H. H. Hampton, of Plymouth, County of Washington and State of North Carolina do make this my Codicil, hereby confirming my last Will made on the 26th day of September, 1910, as far as this Codicil is consistent therewith:-

In lieu of the Five Thousand Dollars to be paid to my daughter Clara B. Hampton by her brother H. R. Hampton out of the book accounts and collections from my Mercantile business, and also in lieu of the rents from the Chisoon, Berry and Andy Lewis farms, and also in lieu of the J. H. Luge note, I devise and bequeath to my daughter Clara B. Hampton, Ten Thousand Dollars to be paid from my bank account in the Bank of Plymouth, all other devises and bequeaths in my former Will, to my daughter Clara B. Hampton with the exceptions as stated above, to remain the same.

To my son H. R. Hampton, I devise and bequeath the L. L. Owens notes and mortgages. I also devise and bequeath to my son H. R. Hampton all the balance of my bank account in the Bank of Plymouth, and all the balance and residue of my entire estate not already bequeathed with the understanding that all debts and other liabilities that I may owe, shall be paid by him.
