Item: I give and bequeath to my two Children Anna Abbott and Linda Myrtle Jackson (\$1000) One Thous and Dollars each it being the sum of my life Policy or Insurance in the Knights of Honor to be paid out at interest on good security and the interest to be used for the purpose of education for my said Children Anna Abbott and Linda Myrtle and the sum aforesaid together with any interest that may be due to be paid to the said Children when they arrive at the age of twenty one years. I also give and bequeath to my aforesaid Children Anna Abbott and Linda Myrtle One Thousand Dollars each and furniture belonging to the same.

Item: I give and devise to my beloved wife Susan M. Jackson all the balance or residue of my Estate not hereinbefore devised or bequeathed in this my last will and testament both real and personal and mixed for and during her natural life or widowhood and at her death or in case of marriage. Then it is my desire that the said property should be equally divided

Between my two children Anna Hobita
and Julia Myrtle. And lastly. I do
humbly constitute and appoint my beloved
wife Susan M. Jackson my lawful attorney
to all intent and purpose to execute this
my last will and testament according to the
true intent and meaning of the same and my
last and former thereof. humbly making and
declaring utterly void all other wills and
testaments by me hitherto made.
