5<sup>th</sup>. I give and bequeath to my daughter Claudia Owens Read, Lucille Owens Murphy, Annie B. Owens Dupree, Mabel Owens my household and kitchen furniture, silver ware, &c., which they can divide between themselves except my sewing machine and piano, which I give to Mabel the youngest.

6<sup>th</sup>. I want my named children to be his own executors in dividing the property, and if either of my named children should die without an heir, this part is to come back to his surviving brothers & sisters.
