11 July 1873 One bed, bedstead, mattress and the Cloths belonging to it.

Item - I give and bequeath to my daughter Roxanna Spinnill
my large bed, bedstead mattress and the Cloths belonging to it.
Item - My house and land that I purchased of Mrs A.C. French
I devise to my children and their heirs as follows. To my daughter
Sophy Amistead One share, my daughter Alice Parngle One share,
to my daughter Clementina Barker One share, to my daughter Nancy
Bill One share, to my daughter Grace Garrett One share, to my daughter
Roxanna Spinnill One share, to my son Samuel Parngle One share
to my son George Parngle One share. And to my daughter Sarah Parngle
One share during her life then to the other children above named
surviving her; my daughter Sarah being of weak mind. I hereby
declare that she shall always be taken care of by her brother and
sister. And for this reason have only devised her a life estate
in my said land.

It is my desire that my land remain in the family always
that if my children for the sake of a division wish to sell let
some one of them buy out the others.

I appoint my son in law Prosper Amistead to be my executor
to this my last will and testament. And in testimony whereof
I have signed to this my hand and seal this the 31st day of May
1873 in the presence of John E Reddick and Jos Windley who are
the subscribing witnesses thereto.

I, Henry Downing of the County of Washington and State of North Carolina being of sound mind and memory, but Considering the uncertainty of my earthly existence, do make and declare this my last Will and Testament, in manner and form following that is to say:

First. That my executors herein after named shall provide for my body a decent burial suitable to their wishes, and pay all funeral expenses out of the money that may justly come into their hands as a part and parcel of my estate.

Item: I give and devise to my beloved wife Martha A. the plantation whereon I now live, to have and to hold to her the said Martha A. for and during the term of her natural life or widowhood, in satisfaction for and in lieu of her former or heretofore of and in all of my real estate.

Item: I give and devise to my eldest son Wm Cotten Downing all that Tract of land known as the "Pococin Farm" to have and to hold to him and his heirs in fee simple forever.

Item: I give and devise to my youngest son Henry A Downing all that Tract of land known as the "Davenport Land", to have and to hold to him and his heirs in fee simple forever.

Item: I give and devise to my youngest son Henry A Downing all that tract of land whereon I now live, except the life estate or widowhood of my beloved wife Martha A. devised in a former item of this my will, to have and to hold unto him and his heirs in fee simple forever.

Item: I give and devise to my son Wm Cotten Downing, his heirs and assigns the house and tract of land wherein my daughter Harriet wife of J.H. Woodland now lives known as the "Evans Place" in special trust and confidence that my said son Wm Cotten Downing shall hold the same to the sole and separate use of my said daughter Harriet for and during the term of her natural life, for and discharge of any and all debts of her present or any future husband, and that after the death of my said daughter Harriet my said son Wm Cotten Downing shall convey the same in fee simple to the heirs of the said Harriet lawfully begotten of her body.

Item: I give and devise to my two sons Wm Cotten Downing and Henry A Downing, equally, to have half and half my said house known as "Cee Mills" and all the houses and improvements connected therewith, and on the premises and the lands belonging thereto, together with my carriage, chair, books and crew, to have and to hold to them and their heirs in fee simple forever.

Item: I give, and bequeath to my youngest daughter Mary Eliza wife of G.B. Johnston all the timber, upon that tract of land
