Second. I give and devise to my only son, Mawson Owens, One Dollar.

Third: I give and devise to my trusted friend, Frank Skiles one flat-bottom row boat,

Fourth: I give and devise to my cousin, James Ellis Davenport, all the balance of my estate of every kind, real or personal.

Fifth: - I hereby constitute and appoint my trusted friend and cousin, James Ellis Davenport my lawful executor to all intents and purposes: to execute this my last Will and Testament, according to the true intent and meaning of the same, and every part and clause thereof, hereby revoking and declaring utterly void all other wills and Testaments by me heretofore made.

In witness whereof, I, the said Wilson Owens, do hereunto set my hand and seal, this the 7th day of November, 1913,
