1st - I wish my body to be buried in a decent

to her son Abram all that portion of land lying  
within the following boundaries. Beginning in a forked  
pine tree of Alexander Davenport thence running  
down the road to a water oak fence running a straight  
course parallel with the Mountain Canal to the length  
line & this is to include all that portion of my land  
laying on the Eastward side of said line.

3rd - I give to my Grand son William Alexander Davenport  
all that piece of land between the grave yard & my fence  
which lies between the road leading to Alexander Davenport's  
& a road leading from my back gate to the woods.

4th And all the rest of my land to the west of the road  
& line specified in # 2 & 3 to my daughter Penny E.  
Clifton & all of my chattel property except what is in # 4.  
4th I give to my Grand son William Alexander Davenport  
my Bedstead & fixtures including Bedstead & bed also  
the covering that belongs with it.

5th - After my burial expenses and other debts are  
paid I want what money I have on hand to be  
equally divided among my three children viz  
W. A. Woodley Penny E. Clifton and Melessa A. Davenport.

I leave this will to be carried out by my children  
as I have stated above.
