my last will and testament

I do hereby execute hereafter named which give my body
a decent burial suitable to the wishes of my friends
and relations and pay all burial or funeral expenses together
with my just debts out of the first money which may
come into their hands belonging to my estate

I do give and devise to my beloved wife L. J. Long one
tract of land in Bush Fork township known as the old
Common Farm place containing 92 acres more or less
besides one other tract in said township known as the
Coke land containing 22 acres more or less during her
natural life if she should die before the youngest of
my children becomes of age said land not to be divided
but my youngest children are to use same for their sup-
port until of age and then to be equally divided
between all my children except William Long, Mary
Smith and Nancy Jane Salling the other three are
to pay them ten dollars apiece and that is to be their
part of my estate except my son Lee Long he is to
have twice the amount or value of land of any one of my
last heirs I give her a right to sell any timber on
said land she proceeds to go for her support and to
pay on any of my debts

I do give and devise to my beloved wife L. J. Long
and her heirs in fee simple one fifth interest in the
shop that I hired from my father N. Long also one
other tract of land known as my home tract on
which I now live containing 9 acres more or less and
for her to have the right to sell or convey parts of it
she proceeds to go and pay my debts or to keep for
her own use

I do give and bequeath all my personal property

my one third interest in a saw mill known as
Long Box of whatever nature or kind that I may have
at hand at my death to my beloved wife L. J. Long
To wit I give my absolute right to each my third interest
in saw mill above mentioned either private or public
as to get the best results

To wit I give Rurman Long the right to use where to build
as long as he desires, and pay rent on the price
of land beginning at the road where his house now
stands to the branch thence East down the branch to
the old still house branch thence North up said branch
and on to the road then West with the road to
the beginning. This contract expires with Rurman
Long at the division of my land or when he finds
it profitable or pay rent

To wit I hereby constitute my wife L. J. Long, and I. T. Bell
my lawful executors to all intents and purposes to
execute this my last will and testament according
to the true intent and meaning of the same, and
every part and clause thereof, hereby resolving and
declaring utterly void all other wills and testament
heretofore made by me. In witness whereof I the said
