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DEATH NOTICES FROM THE SOUTH CAROLINA  
GAZETTE FROM SEPTEMBER 29, 1766 TO DECEMBER  
19, 1774

These death notices fill in the gap in the *Death Notices in the South Carolina Gazette 1732-1775*, compiled and edited by A. S. Salley Jr., and published by the Historical Commission of South Carolina in 1917. The omission occurs between September 15, 1766, and January 2, 1775, and was due to the carelessness of the printer in losing the copy of the notices taken from the intervening issues of the *Gazette*.

Last Monday died at Beaufort, much lamented, Mr. Francis Smart, merchant there, and brother to the Superintendent of Indian affairs for the Southern department of America. (Monday, September 29, 1766.)

Monday last died, Capt. John M'Cleish, Master of the Sloop Fanny.—and, on Tuesday, at Stono, aged 67, Mr. Robert Mac-kewn, a Native of this Province. (Monday Oct. 6, 1766.)

Saturday the 4th Instant died at Stono, greatly lamented by all who had the pleasure of her acquaintance Mrs. Anne Tonge, the Wife of the Reverend Mr. John Tonge, Rector of St. Pauls Parish.

Wednesday last died, aged 77 Years, Mrs. Mary Heskett, Widow, who had lived in this Town about 55 Years.

Yesterday died Mrs. Mary Frost, aged 79 Years, who came to this Province from New England in the Year 1714.

This morning died said to be 67 Years, the Honourable Hector Bellinger [(sic) Beranger is the name] De Beaufain, Esq; Fellow of the Royal Society, formerly a Member of His Majesty's Council, and 24 Years Collector of His Majesty's Customs in this Province—The least we can say of him is, that he has not left a Superior Character in the Universe, nor many equal. [Account of his funeral in the next issue.] Long-Canes, Sept. 24, 1766

Of a Miscarriage of Twins, on the 10th Instant, died here in the 24th Year of her age, one of the most pious and accomplished young Women of these parts, in the person of Mrs. Calhoun, the Wife of Patrick Calhoun Esq; and Daughter of the Rev. Mr. Alexander Craighead. (Monday, Oct. 13, 1766.)

From (Port Royal) We hear that about a fortnight since died, at the advanced age of 87, Years, Mrs. Reynolds, a native of this Province.

Last night died, Mrs. Agnes Lind, Milliner, a very industrious good woman, the Wife of Mr. Thomas Lind.

Wednesday last died, much lamented by all that had an acquaintance with him, but more particularly by the Parish of St. James Goose Creek, which he had represented in the Assembly of this Province, and to which (as he resided there) he was very useful and a great benefactor, Robert Hume Esq; aged 37. Men of his character and disposition when they die, are always a public loss. (Monday Oct. 27, 1766.)

Saturday the 1st Instant died at Beaufort, Port-Royal, Capt. George Perkins, master of the ship St. Helena, lately launched there. (Monday, Nov. 10, 1766.)

Last Tuesday night died, Mr. William Watson, lately arrived here from England, and son of the late Mr. John Watson, of London, formerly of this place, merchant. (Monday, Nov. 17, 1766.)

Friday night died, aged 70 years, William Elliott, Esq; as hearty a man as most of 40 years of age, and a native of this province.

This morning died, Capt Silas Miles, of St. Paul's parish. (Monday, Dec. 1, 1766.)

Tuesday last died aged 63 years, after a very tedious indisposition, William Pinckney, Esq; Commissary-general, (and a native) of this province. 'Tis said, Benjamin Simons Esq; will be appointed to succeed MR. Pinckney as commissary-general. (Monday, Dec. 8, 1766.)

Tuesday last died, greatly lamented, aged 73 years, Mrs. Elizabeth Hunt, a native of this province, and practising mid-wife.—It is said to appear from an account regularly kept by her, that she had been present at the birth of near 4000 children. She was remarkably strong and healthy, till within a few months before her death, and, had she taken common care of her constitution, promised very fair to have lived beyond the century. (Monday, Dec., 22, 1766)

Yesterday died suddenly, at his plantation near Dorchester, Adam Daniel, Esq., and

Last night, near 70 years of age, Mr. Edward Bullard, of this town, always remarkably strong, hearty and chearful, till within a fortnight of his decease. (Monday, Jan. 19, 1767)

Tuesday, the 20th inst. died in St. Thomas' Parish, at the advanced age of 77 years, Mrs. Mary-Ann Bourdeaux, a native of this Province. (Monday, Jan. 26, 1767.)

Last Monday night died, Mr. Caleb Lloyd, Merchant, and co-partner with Mr. John Neyle. This gentleman's character and disposition were so amiable, that his friends sustain a particular loss in his death, which would have been generally lamented, but for the prejudices that were conceived against him, upon his being unhappily appointed Distributor of Stamps in this Province, under the late Act of the British Parliament that proved so universally odious and detestable to all America, even where a suspension of its operation could not be procured. (Monday, Feb. 16, 1767)

On the 1st instant died, at her plantation near Ashley-Ferry, upwards of 80 years of age, Mrs. Margaret Ladson, a native of this province, and a daughter of Mr. Daniel Donovan, who was one of the first settlers, and remarkably distinguished himself by the gallant defence he made against the Indians, during the war with those people, which begun in the year 1715, and the use he made on that occasion of some dogs which he brought with him from Ireland. (Monday, March 16, 1767)

At a Court of General Sessions of the Peace-Oyer and Terminer, Assize and General Goal Delivery, which was opened on the 18th past, and ended the 25th, the following persons were capitally convicted, viz:

Antonio Christian: of Murder.

Christian was hanged the 31st instant. The others were pardoned by His Majesty. (Monday, April 13, 1767)

The 30th past died, in this town, William Branford, Esq. reckoned one of the best planters in this province. (Monday, May 11, 1767)

Wednesday last died, Mr. William Kelly, one of the Branch Pilots for the Bar and Harbour of Charles Town.

The same day the Body of James Riggs, an Apprentice Lad to Captain Peter Mallet, who had been missing two Days, floated up into Col. Beale's Dock, being cut under his Chin from Ear to Ear: A jury of Inquest sat on the Body, and next day brought in their Verdict of Wilful Murder by Persons unknown; since which, two

**Apprentice Lads** have been committed to Jail on Suspicion of **being the Perpetrators.** (Monday, June 29, 1767)

**Last Monday**, died suddenly, Capt. George Spender, late master of the ship Katharine, of London. (Monday, July 6, 1767)

. . . . **Last Thursday** died Mr. George Marshall, having survived his wife only a few weeks. As a very honest man, which was his character, his death is much regretted by all who knew him. (Monday, July 20, 1767)

**Last Tuesday evening**, one Sullivan, a Ship Carpenter, was shot through the body and killed on the spot, on the high road, about half a mile without the town, by one Floyd, a Clock-Maker. The Jury of inquest brought in their verdict of Wilful murder, and Floyd is committed to jail, to be tried at next October sessions. (Monday, Aug. 3, 1767)

**Saturday sennight** died, at his plantation in Prince William's Parish, aged 72 years, capt. John Bull, brother to the late, and uncle to the present Lieutenant governor of this province.

**Yesterday** died Mrs. Anne Mathewes, wife of Mr. John Mathewes (son of James). (Monday, August 24, 1767)

**On Friday night** died, aged 79 years, Mr. Adam Stewart, who had resided near sixty years in this province, and was in the vessel that took Major Stede Bonnet, the pirate, who with his crew were executed here about fifty years ago. (Monday, Aug. 31, 1767)

**Sunday the 30th past**, died, Mrs. Peronneau, relict of the late Henry Peronneau, Esq. (Monday, Sept. 7, 1767)

**Saturday last** died, Mr. Balguy Littlewood, merchant. (Monday, Sept. 14, 1767)

**The 9th instant** died here, lieut. George Towers; and on the 14th Mr. William Grant, pursar, both of his Majesty's ship, Sardoine, commanded by Capt. James Hawker. (Monday, Sept. 21, 1767)

**Last Tuesday** died, just seven weeks after his marriage to Miss Angelica Le Tour, Mr. Francis Virambaut, aged 68 years.

**On Friday night** died, Mr. John Neyle, merchant. (Monday, Sept. 28, 1767)

**The 21st past**, died at Savannah, in Georgia, Thomas Vincent, Esq. one of the Representatives for that town, in the assembly of that province. (Monday, Oct. 5, 1767)

**Last Tuesday** died, universally regretted, that truly pious and good man, the Rev. Mr. Joseph Dacre Appleby Wilton, assistant

lecturer to the rector of the parish of St. Philip; by whose death, the united voice of all ranks of people in this town, and of every one who had any connexion or acquaintance with him justify us in saying, the public has sustained an irreparable loss. (Monday, Oct. 12, 1767)

**Monday last**, died, after a short illness, the humane, social and friendly Doctor William Pillans, who was very useful in his profession, and had he lived, would have become eminent in it.

**On Saturday**, the 26th past, died at Beaufort, Port Royal, Mrs. Eleanor Proctor; a lady universally regretted by all who had the pleasure of her acquaintance, and particularly lamented by her intimates. (Monday, Oct. 19, 1767)

**Wednesday last** died that truly pious and good man, the Rev. Mr. Daniel Wheeler, minister of the society or congregation distinguished by the name of general Baptists.

**Last Monday morning** died, Mrs. Susannah Scott, aged 75 years. She was brought to this Province from New England, at about 5 years of age. (Monday, Nov. 16, 1767)

**Saturday night** died, Mrs. Anne Outerbridge, the wife of Capt. White Outerbridge. (Monday, Nov. 23, 1767)

**Last night** died Mr. Francis Lee, of Georgia. (Monday, Nov. 30, 1767)

**On Friday last**, died Mr. William Townsend, of John's Island. (Monday, Dec. 7, 1767)

**On Wednesday** died Mrs. Elizabeth Lord, the wife of Mr. Andrew Lord, and sister to Mr. Greenwood, merchant in London. (Monday Dec. 14, 1767)

**Last Monday night** died, much lamented, Mrs. Mary Wragg, the wife of William Wragg, esq., and was, agreeable to her own request, interred without any funeral pomp, on Thursday following. (Monday, Jan. 4, 1768)

**This morning** died, the right honourable Lady Anne, one of the daughters of the Earl of Cromartie, formerly married to the honourable Edward Atkin, Esq. Superintendent of Indian Affairs for the Southern Department of North America, and since his decease to John Murray, Esq. M.D. (Monday, Jan. 18, 1768)

**Last Friday** died, after a long and severe indisposition, and universally regretted, Mrs. Mary Gadsden, the wife of Christopher Gadsden, Esq.



~~Tuesday last died~~, aged 64 years, George Seaman, Esq.; who ~~formerly was an eminent~~ merchant here, but had retired from business. (Monday, Feb. 2, 1768)

Yesterday died, Mr. Richard Downes, jun. Merchant, of Dorchester. (Monday, Feb. 16, 1768)

Last Friday night died, the hon. Charles Shinner Esq. a member of His Majesty's Council, and late chief justice of this province. His lady, and both his children, died some time before him. (Monday, Feb. 29, 1768)

The 13th past died, at Pine-Tree Hill, Samuel Wyly, Esq.

On Saturday died, Mr. Alexander Petrie. (Monday, March 7, 1768)

Last Tuesday night, as Capt. Richard Davis, of the Ship Hope, was going on board, he fell off the stage and was drowned. (Monday, March 21, 1768)

On Wednesday last died, William Middleton, Esq. eldest son of Colonel Thomas Middleton, deceased, and a representative in the present assembly for the parish of St. Helena. (Monday, Apl. 11, 1768)

On Tuesday last, died, in the 69th year of her age, Mrs. Sarah Stoutenburgh, a native of this province, and relict of the late Mr. Luke Stoutenburgh. (Monday, Apl. 18, 1768)

Last Saturday died, Mr. James Streater, aged 76 years.

Also Mr. William Dandridge, aged 47. (Monday, May 2, 1768)  
Thursday last died, Mrs. Sarah Skirving, the wife of James Skirving, Esq.; (formerly Mrs. Champneys)

Yesterday morning died, after a tedious and lingering illness, Mrs. Elizabeth Pinckney, the wife of Roger-Pinckney, Esq. Provost Marshal of this Province. (Monday, Aug. 15, 1768)

The Rev. Mr. James Crallan, late Master of the Free School here, and Assistant-Lecturer for St. Philip's Parish, died the twelfth day after he went to Sea on his passage for England. (Monday, Aug. 29, 1768)

On Thursday died, Mrs. Elizabeth Mullins, the wife of Mr. George Mullins of St. Paul's Parish. (Monday, Sept. 19, 1768)

Last Friday night died, Capt. Henry Richardson, of this town, and

last night died, Mrs. Anne Howarth, the wife of Colonel Probart Howarth, commander of Fort Johnson—as universally regretted

dead as esteemed living, by all her friends and acquaintances. (Monday, Sept. 26, 1768)

Last Monday at 8 o'clock in the evening died, (greatly lamented by all who knew her) after a lingering illness, which she bore with, great resignation, Mrs. Elizabeth Elliott, (relict of the late Barnard Elliott, Esq.) aged 51 years and 7 months. (Monday, Oct. 3, 1768)

This day died, Mr. Samuel Peronneau, Merchant. (Monday, Oct. 17, 1768)

Tuesday last died, Mr. James O'Brian, attorney at law.

A few days before, died Mr. Bennett Oldham, of the same profession.

Last Wednesday died, after a lingering indisposition, Mr. George Bedon, merchant, son of Henry.

And on Saturday night died suddenly, Mrs. Anne Child, relict, of the late Mr. Joseph Child, of Ashley-River.

On Tuesday, the 18th instant, died at St. Augustine, much lamented, William Greening, Esq. naval officer, and register of grants in East-Florida, and formerly post-master there—a gentleman of most amiable character.

The honourable William Simpson, Esq. Chief Justice of Georgia, died there last week. (Monday, Oct. 24, 1768)

Thursday last died, Mr. Ezekiel David, Merchant. (Monday Oct. 31, 1768)

Last Saturday night died, Captain William Kenny, of the Ship Amity's Advice, which put in here the 18th past in distress, from Jamaica, bound for London. (Monday, Nov. 7, 1768)

Thursday last departed this life, in the 42nd year of his age, much lamented, the ingenious Mr. William Johnson (well known in America by his Lectures and Experiments in Electricity, and here, by the excellent plan he had formed for an English School) whose death may be justly reckoned a loss to the public, and is an irreparable one to his family.

The 26th past died, Mr. George Livingston, an eminent Factor in his town.

On Monday night died here, Mr. Robert Davies, in the 108th year of his age. (Thursday, Jan. 5, 1769)

Last Monday died, Mr. George Gordon, of Jamaica, who lately came here for the recovery of his health. (Thursday, Jan. 5, 1769.)

On Sunday last died, in the 90th year of her age, having lived upwards of 50 years in this province, Mrs. Ann Peacock, relict of Mr. Peacock, who died about 30 years ago. (Thursday, Jan. 12, 1769.)

Yesterday morning died at Dorchester, Mrs. Mary McNeill, the amiable consort of Doct. Archibald McNeill. (Thursday, Jan. 19, 1769.)

Last Friday died Mrs. Frances Prue, the Wife of Mr. John Prue, whose Funeral was conducted in the same Manner as the late Mrs. Gadsden's. (Monday, Feb. 16, 1769.)

Last Saturday evening, between 7 and 8 o'clock a most melancholy accident happened here, viz: A sailing boat returning from Hobcaw, in which were Capt. George Higgins of the Snow Portland, Mr. Thomas Coleman, upholsterer, Mr. John Hill, (who lived at Mr. Paul Townsend's) Mr. Thomas Gunter, an apprentice to Capt. Higgins, two negro men, and a negro boy, by some mismanagement in a sudden squall of wind, filled, and sunk, off Capt. Gadsden's Wharf, whereby Capt. Higgins, Mr. Coleman, Mr. Hill, and one of the negro men lost their lives. The rest were with some difficulty saved, as they drove by some vessels in the stream before the town. Neither the boat, nor any of the drowned have yet been found. The unfortunate Capt. Higgins, who had been married only three weeks before this catastrophe, is particularly regretted.

Last Monday morning died, John Cattell, Esq. of Wampee-Savannah, captain of the St. George's troop of horse. (Thursday, March 9, 1769.)

On the 5th instant died, in Prince William's Parish, of which he was an inhabitant, truly and greatly regretted. Mr. Robert McLeod, merchant; who, by his upright and friendly behavior, was much esteemed by the many that had the pleasure of his acquaintance. (Thursday, March 16, 1769.)

Last Friday night died, Capt. James Rodgers, formerly a Branch-Pilot for this Port and Harbour, afterwards, in the last war, commander of a privateer fitted out here, and since master of different vessels in the merchant service. He was remarkable for his bravery, and not less so for strict honour in all his dealing; but he was left an almost helpless family.

The same day the body of Mr. Thomas Coleman, one of the unfortunate persons drowned on the 4th instant, was found near Capt. Lempriere's point, and on Saturday brought to town, where, after a jury had made the necessary inquisition, it was decently interred, the Fellowship and Recess Societies attending the funeral. Last Monday the body of Mr. John Hill was likewise found, near the same place, brought to town, and buried as the former. The body of Captain George Higgins has not yet been found, nor is the boat wherein the three were drowned. (Thursday, March 23, 1769.)

Friday last, the body of the unfortunate Captain Higgins, was taken up, in the river, and the next day decently interred; most of the respectable inhabitants of the town attending the funeral, as a mark of the particular respect they bore to that worthy man when living. (Thursday, March 30, 1769.)

Last Tuesday Morning, died, Mrs. Martha Bremar, Widow of the late Mr. Francis Bremar.

The same day died, Peter Broughton, Esq. of St. John's Parish. (Thursday, May 11, 1769.)

Last Saturday died the eldest daughter of His Excellency the Right Honourable Lord Charles-Greville Montagu, Governor in Chief, etc. of this Province. And the next day His Excellency returned from his Journey to the Western Frontiers.

On Wednesday the 17th inst. died Capt. James Caird, Master of the Brigantine Ashton, of Liverpoole.

Last Friday died here, Mrs. Jane Douxsaint, a Native of this Province, aged 73 years. (Thursday, May 25, 1769.)

On Sunday last died, aged 53 years, Mrs. Susannah Bee, Relict

the late Colonel John Bee; a Lady of so amiable and exemplary disposition, as renders her Death a Loss to Society. (Thursday, June 15, 1769.)

Sunday last died, much regretted by those who knew him, Mr. Christopher Simpson, merchant.

Last Monday died, Mr. John St. Leger, Attorney at Law. (Thursday, June 29, 1769.)

Last Sunday morning died, a Batchelor, aged 51 Years, Mr. George Matthewes, who had many good Qualities, and has left a considerable Fortune—No Scarves were given at his funeral, nor, (as we hear) was any New Mourning bought, tho' the Train of Relations that attended his Funeral was very considerable. (Thursday, July 13, 1769.)

Last Saturday died, Mrs. Catharine Waring, wife of Mr. Waring. (Thursday, July 27, 1769.)

Last Night died Mr. James Sands, merchant. (Monday, Aug. 3, 1769.)

Last Monday died, Mr. Thomas Lee, Carpenter, aged fifty-nine years, thirty-five of which he has lived in this Town. (Thursday, Aug. 10, 1769.)

Yesterday se'nnight died, upwards of 75 years of Age, and a Native of this Province, Mrs. Rachel Howard, the Widow of Mr. Experience Howard, who died many years ago. (Thursday, Aug. 17, 1769.)

The same Day died, Mrs. Elizabeth Clitherall, the Wife of Dr. James Clitherall. (Thursday, Aug. 31, 1769.)

Last Friday died Thomas Smith, sen. Esq. aged 74 years, most of which he had lived in this Province.

Last Monday died the amiable consort of Mr. Thomas Walter, Merchant.

The same died, the Rev. Mr. Farmer, Rector of St. John's Parish, Berkley County, universally regretted by his parishoners, and all that had the Pleasure of an Acquaintance with him. (Thursday, Sept. 14, 1769.)

On Thursday last died, Mrs. Ann Ward, the Wife of Mr. John Ward, Taylor. (Thursday, Sept. 21, 1769.)

Last Saturday Evening died, Mr. Joseph Ball, sen. of this Town, aged 66 years. (Thursday, Sept. 28, 1769.)

Last Sunday died, Mrs. Isabella Wish, the wife of Mr. John Wish. (Thursday, Oct. 5, 1769.)

On Friday last died, much regretted, Mr. James Reid, of Pon Pon, who was one of the representatives of the Parish of St. Bartholomew, in the present General Assembly.

The same Day also died suddenly, aged 67 years, Captain Edward Lightwood, many Years Gunner of Charles Town. (Thursday, Oct. 18, 1769.)

On Thursday last died, Mrs. Marion Charlotte Porcher, the last of six children left by Mr. Philip Gendron, one of the first French Protestants that arrived and settled at Santee, in this Province, about the year 1685, and who died about the year 1725. Last Tuesday, died, universally regretted, on his Plantation at Combahee, of a nervous Fever, and after a short illness, William Ward Crosthwaite, Esq. formerly of the Army, aged only Twenty-six years. (Thursday, Nov. 2, 1769.)

Last Saturday morning died, much regretted by the Gentlemen of the Turf, and all his Acquaintance, Mr. Thomas Nightingale, who has for several years past kept the House and Course called New-Market.

On Sunday Night died, Mr. David Stoddard, Merchant.

Last Tuesday died Mrs. Elizabeth Williams, Wife of Robert Williams, jun. esq.

The humorous Mr. John Snelling, and Mr. James Duthie.

Died, Nov. 9th, Mrs. Patience Catharine Stevens, Wife of Mr. Daniel Stevens, after a long and lingering illness, which she bore with steady patience, and Christian Resignation. (Thursday, Nov. 9, 1769.)

On Tuesday last died, Mrs. Elizabeth Fuller, wife of Thomas Fuller, Esq. of St. Andrew's Parish. (Thursday, Nov. 23, 1769.)

Last Monday died, much regretted, Whitmarsh Fuller, Esq. of St. Andrew's Parish.

Yesterday morning died, Mr. Elijah Prioleau. (Thursday, Dec. 7, 1769.)

On Tuesday died, universally regretted, John Chapman, Esq. an eminent Merchant of this Town. (Thursday, Dec. 14, 1769.)

Last Saturday Morning died, in the 71st year of her age Mrs. Judith Wragg, Relict of the Hon. Joseph Wragg, Esq.; she was a native of this Province, and as she lived universally and deservedly respected, so she died no less lamented. (Thursday Dec. 21, 1769.)

On Thursday last died, aged 84, Mrs. Ann Austin, Relict of the late Colonel Robert Austin. She arrived in this Province about 40 years of age. (Thursday, Jan. 11, 1770.)

About a month ago died at Purrysburg, aged 96 Years, Mrs. Magdalen Truan, possessing all her Faculties up to her Death; She came into this Province upwards of 30 Years ago, after having undergone the most severe Persecutions in France, during which she lived concealed for a considerable Time in the Cave of a Rock.

On Sunday last died, aged 75 Years, Mr. Daniel Bourcet, one of the oldest Inhabitants of this Town; and who, by dint of Industry, had acquired a very considerable Fortune.

Last Monday Night, died suddenly, (having been upon the Grand Jury all the Week before) James Sharp, Esq. of Ponpon; a sensible, facetious and valuable man, such as one of our most celebrated Poets stiles "the noblest Work of God." (Thursday, Jan. 25, 1770.)

Last Monday Night, died, Ebenezer Simmons, Esq. (Thursday, Feb. 1, 1770.)

Last Friday died suddenly, Captain Thomas Courtin, Master of the Brigantine Polly, of Poole, lately arrived from Newfoundland.

On Saturday last died, Mrs. Judith Guerard, the Wife of David Guerard, Esq. of St. John's Parish.

On Thursday last died, at Ashley-Ferry, the Rev. Daniel Dobell, a General Baptist Preacher, Son of the Rev. Philip Dobell, who died at the same Place on the 20th Instant.

Mr. Charles Boyd, one of the unfortunate Persons, who was blown up in firing the Salute at the Market-Wharf on Sunday the 14 ult, died last Tuesday. -He has left a poor Widow and Daughter. (Monday, Sept. 19, 1774)

Last Tuesday Morning died, a most humane and generous spirited young Gentleman—Mr. Michael Meara, Nephew to James Parsons, Esq.

Last Night died, much regretted, Mr. Aaron Simonson, a young Gentleman who a few Years since came into this Province from New York, with Mr. Jeremiah Brower, with whom he established himself in the commercial way here. (Monday, Sept. 26, 1774)

Yesterday morning died, Mr. James Guerin, a very promising

young Man, Son of Mr. Mathurin Guerin, of St. Andrew's Parish. (Monday, Oct. 3, 1774)

Last Saturday died, much regretted, Mr. Arthur Peronneau, Brother to Mr. Treasurer Peronneau. (Monday, Oct. 17, 1774)

Thursday evening, died suddenly, at His House in George-Yard, Lombard-Street, London, Mr. Richard Grubb, a Carolina Merchant. (Monday, Oct. 24, 1774)

Last Friday died, much regretted by the whole Parish, to which, as well as to his Family and Friends his Death is an irreparable Loss, Daniel Ravenell, sen, Esq. of St. John's Parish, in Berkeley County.

Yesterday died, Miss Sarah Croft, the last of the Family of the late Childemas Croft, Esq.

Last Saturday evening died, in the 81st, or as some suppose, in the 85th year of his age, Thomas Lamboll, Esq; a gentleman of proverbial Integrity and Uprightness, and much lamented, tho' he died at so late a Period. He had sustained sundry honourable Employments in the Government with great Dignity, but for a long time past had declined public Business, contented to serve Mankind in a Sphere where he might be useful tho' less conspicuous. Neither Scarves, gloves or Mourning were used at this Funeral, altho' he left a very numerous Train of most affection relations; who have thereby conformed to the 8th Article of the Association entered into by the late Congress, in Behalf and on the part of the Colonies. (Monday, Nov. 21, 1774)

On Sunday the 4th instant, died, after a lingering indisposition,

and exceedingly regretted by her numerous relations and friends, Mrs. Rebecca Webb, the Wife of Benjamin Webb, Esq.

Last Tuesday died here, a worthy good Woman, Mrs. Katharine Poinsett, Widow of Mr. Elisha Poinsett. (Dec. 12, 1774)

The Remains of Mrs. Mary Elliott (the Wife of the Hon. Barnard Elliott) who died in Child-bed, on Sunday the 11th Instant, were interred on Wednesday last. Few have left more Relations, few had more Friends, than this most amiable and excellent Lady, yet the latter clause of the 8th article of the Continental Association was strictly adhered to at this funeral.

On Friday the 9th Instant, died at Hobcaw, in the 72nd Year of his Age, Mr. David Linn, who was much esteemed by all his Acquaintances, and has left a considerable Fortune to be enjoyed by some poor relations. (Monday, Dec. 19, 1774)
