CHARLES EVANS

CHARLES EVANS was b. 1803 in Georgia, a farmer, and m. Ann (b. 1806). After the death of Ann in 1830, Charles m. 10/15/1845 Judith Bassett. Charles had seven farms in all, comprising a total of 665 acres. Some of the land was in the 13th District of old Monroe Co., now Bibb Co. Re concentrated his efforts on blacksmithing, however, and only raised a few domestic animals, such as pigs, chickens and cows for personal use; also tobacco as a prime crop. Issue:

I. WILLIAM EVANS b. 1829, d. 1882. He worked on the family farm until he was about 21 years old. He learned how to make tools on his father's farm, later became a blacksmith.

CLEMENT A. EVANS

GENERAL CLEMENT A. EVANS, famous Georgian whose brilliant and devoted service on the field of battle for the Confederacy during the four years of the Civil War is well-known to Georgians. Atlanta Georgian, 12/19/1906, General Evans says:

"I enjoyed as a soldier the four Christmas seasons of the Confederate war in the immediate presence of the enemy without being engaged in battle or even in a skirmish. You ask, Did the Confederate soldiers observe and enjoy the Christmas season? Of course they did...."

"....I may also mention that my personal enjoyment of the Christmas of 1862 was increased by the visit to our army at Fredericksburg at that time of my eldest son, then about two months old, who was promptly enlisted for the war' in Co. E, Thirty-First Georgia Infantry, and was under fire in the first battle of the early spring, behaving very gallantly considering that he was not aware of any danger. The adjutant general of my brigade, Colonel Ned Lawton, an officer of rare merit whom I loved as a brother, was mortally wounded by my side in the midst of the Fredericksburg battle and the young recruit just referred to was named in his honor."

General Evans was b. 1833 Stewart Co., Ga. In 1880 he was a resident of Oak Street in Atlanta, according to the census. Mary A. Walton, and (2) 10/14/1886 Mrs. Sallie A. Howard, DeKalb Co., Ga.

When Jeff Davis, aged former President of the Confederacy, was in Atlanta on May 1, 1886, attending the unveiling ceremonies of the Ben Hill monument, the editor of the DeKalb Chronicle wrote on April 29th:

"Everybody in DeKalb, who can will go to Atlanta next Saturday to see Jeff Davis one more time before the Grand Old Man passes from earth to heaven. We hope on that day to hear the real, old fashion rebel yell, having never heard it. We reckon it will offend no one, but if so, let it offend."

A great column of veterans marched down Peachtree Street, and when the head of the column reached the platform, they opened ranks and left a lane between, for Mr. Davis' carriage. The second carriage contained Governor McDaniel, General Clement A. Evans, Mayor W. S. Reese of Montgomery, and Mayor George Hillyer of Atlanta. Many other carriages followed. It was General Clement A. Evan's soft, tender voice, which opened the exercises with prayer. Afterwards, the life-size statue of Senator Hill was unveiled, and ceremonies began. Children:

JOHN EVANS

JOHN EVANS was b. 1770, presumably in Anderson Co., S. C. He was listed on the 1840-1850 Anderson Co. Census, in 1850, with his son, Willis Evans. About 1855 he removed to Franklin Co., Ga. where he was listed as a shoemaker on the 1860 Census in the household of his son, James Oliver Evans. He must have died shortly afterwards, however, there were no estate records found for him in Franklin or Hart Counties.

One reference states that John Evans was an early Franklin Co., Ga. settler and that hand find the state that hand last the strain of two draws. Also, that this John Evans Was a Was a way of the strain of the str

river from Franklin Co., this John Evans does not appear to be John Evans, b. 1770, for there is no evidence that his family removed themselves from Anderson Co., S. C. until about 1855. Although one of his sons, James Oliver, came to Georgia around 1855, another son, Willis, came much later, around 1870.

John Evans was m. to Ealey who d. before 1850. This evidence comes forward from the LWT of John's sister, Elizabeth Evans, which was dated Feb. 1814, Anderson Co., S. C., in which she named her brother and his wife, Ealey. She also named their sister, Hannah Barnett, probably the daughter of Job Barnett, and their daughter, Amey Barnett. Further, she mentioned John's daughter, Jean Evans. Issue of John and Ealey Evans:
