

Letters of guardianship to Nicholas Mathew, Margaret
and Mary Burnham granted to Charles Burnham

By his Excellency Robert Johnson Esq: Lt:
General Governor and Commander in Chief
in and over his Majesty's Province of
South Carolina and Ordinary of same
To all whom these presents shall come Greeting

Whereas Nicholas Mathew, Margaret and Mary
Burnham, joint Children of Charles Burnham
late of this Province deceased, his day made humble
application to me that Charles Burnham their
Brother and now of this Province of late, who hath
abode in that he may take unto his care the charge
and management of the said Infant children and their
Estate and may be appointed their Guardian therefor
for the better securing of their Estate and for the more
carefull maintenance and Education of the said
Infant children out of the Confinse I repose in the
Piodem and Integrity of you the said Charles Burnham
do hereby Committe the said Infants Guardianship and
Education of the said Infant Children to the said Charles
Burnham their brother according to their desire, hereby
Charging him that he do maintain them in meat
drink washing, clothing, and such good
Education as may be fitting according to the Conveni-
ence and Interest of the said Infant Children
during their minority and that the said Charles
Burnham do enquire into and take care and Charge
of their Estate both real and personal and do every
thing as a Guardian by law ought to do and a true
and faithful account thereof and what Estate of the
said Nicholas Mathew, Margaret and Mary
Burnham shall come to your hands to render
when you shall be required by such Guardians

is held to be done by the said Infant Children, when
they shall attain to the age of twenty one years, and
I hereby revoke all Letters of guardianship heretofore
granted.

Murd Dwd. 553:

To the name of God Almy the tenth day of
August 1781 William Estl of South Carolina
being sick and weak in body but of perfect mind
and memory thankes be given unto God. Therefore
calling to mind the mortality of my body and
knowing that it is appointed for all men once to
die do make and Ordain this my last Will and
Testament that is to say Principall and first
of all I give and recommend my Subiects into the hands
of God that gave them my body I command to the
Parish to be buried in due Christian burial at
the discretion of my Executors nothing doubting
but at the general Resurrection I shall receive
I leave again by the mighty power of god and
as touching such worlds Estate Wherewith it
hath pleased God to bless me in this life I give
Dower and Dower of the same in the following manner
and form

In primis After all my lawfull debts is paid
I give and bequeath to Christopher Estl
