State of South Carolina, City of Charleston. The last Will & Testament of Francis Weyman, Grocer, of the City of Charleston State aforesaid.

In the Name of God Amen. I Francis Weyman of the City of Charleston Grocer, being of sound mind and understanding but weak of Body do hereby make this as my last Will and Testament.

First. After my death I will that my funeral expences and just debts be paid as soon as possible, to effect which, should I have not sufficient it is my desire that so much of my personal property be sold as to meet the same.

Second. After my just debts and funeral expences are paid I will and bequeath the whole of the residue of my property real and personal to the use of my beloved wife Ann Catharine for herself and in trust for our children who are to be sustained and educated out of my said estate until they shall become of such age as they may be enabled to do for themselves, and in the event of my said wife Ann Catharine again intermarrying, it is my will that the whole of my property be disposed of, paying to her the one third thereof and vesting the balance in a way as may be most advantageous for the benefit of my said children.

In order that this my last will and testament may be carried into full effect I do hereby nominate and appoint my beloved wife Ann Catharine Weyman, and my beloved Brother in Law John Frederick and John H. Stearns as my executor and Executors of this my last Will and Testament, reserving to my executor the exclusive right of sustaining the interests of my children.

In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal at Charleston on the 2nd day of October one thousand eight hundred and thirty four and on the sixteenth year of American Independence.

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In order that this my last will and testament may be carried into full effect I do hereby nominate and appoint my beloved wife Ann Catharine, my son, and my beloved Brother in Law John Fredericks and John H. Kneeling as my executors and Executors of this my last Will and Testament, reserving to my executors the exclusive right of sustaining the interests of my children.

In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal at New Britain on the 2nd day of October one thousand eight hundred and thirty five and in the sixtieth year of American Independence.

the following negroes, with the issue and increase of the females viz: Comba, Drama,
and Peter, Elmy (and Johnny, and also the Brick Houses which I have had built upon
the lot number forty nine (49) and all my furniture and property of every description
that I may own or become entitled to at the time of my death, to her and her heirs
and assigns for ever.
