I John Carleton do Protest and Declare that I have
 heard Mr. James St. John Surveyor General of this Province
 declare and say that he allowed Mr. Lehigh of the Treasury
 one hundred Pounds, P. Annum out of his Comptrollers Place
 This Declaration I have heard him make Publicly and
 frequently but more Especially one day Talking of the Inhabitants
 of South Carolina I advised him to Come to better Terms with
 them he Swore he neither Regarded Council or Assembly or
 any opposition they Could give him his Interest being Exceeding
 In England for besides his friend the Bishop of Bangor he
 was secure of Mr. Lehighs Interest and friendship upon Occasion
 of the allowance out of the Place above mentioned given
 under my hand this 26 day of August 1732

Mr. Gregory being asked by Mr. St. John who was in
 Company with Mr. Carleton when he made the said Affid. Answered
 that Mr. Nathaniel Johnson his Excellency's Son being further asked whether
 Mr. Carleton expressed any Regretment at the Time of taking the
 said Affid. against him the said Mr. St. John
 Answered that Mr. Carleton said that Mr. St. John was a
 Scoundrel & did not know how to use any Gentl. words or Words to

That Effect but that he was sorry it was come to that You
to be made so Publick
Bung, asked by the said Mr. St. John whether he heard any thing
more against him or for him

Answered that he did not but only that Mr. Carlston at the time
of taking the said Affidavit told him that his Excellency the Gov^r had
Desired him to go before some Magistrate and make affidavit
of what he knew of the affairs in the said Declaration mentioned
Bung asked by his Excellency whether Mr. Carlston at that time expressed
that any threats or Intimidations or Promises had been made use of
by his Excellency or any other Person to Induce the said Carlston to
take the said Affidavit

Answered that he had no Suspicion of any thing of that sort
and therefore he did not Ask him those Questions but that Mr.
Carlston also said at that time that Mr. Rutledge had heard
the same thing from Mr. St. John and that he believed Mr.
Rutledge would make Oath of it if he called upon

Mr. Rutledge Affidavit concerning Mr. St. John

(Andrew Rutledge of Charles Town City came before me and
being duly Sworn saith that he this Depont at severall
times heard Mr. James St. John Juror of this Province in a
Publick manner declare and say that he valued not a figg the Governor
Council or assembly here for he had an Interest in England better
than Shure for Besides the Interest of his Cousen the Bishop
of Bangor he had also the Interest of Mr. Schrup of the Treasurers
and the said Mr. St. John often boasted that he allowed the
Mr. Schrup one hundred Pounds p^a Annum out of his place
here of Auditor or Comptroller or used Words to that Effect the Like

Mr. Rutledge being asked by Mr. St. John whether he
heard Mr. Schrup to be his Cousin or not he answered
and saith that he did not know Mr. Schrup and whether
he would tell him that Mr. Schrup was his Cousin

Answered in the Affirmative that he did not and that
that also was for his Service in his Capacity of Auditor

the Late Wm. Jennings Esq^r did not ask him whether
the Surveyor Generals Office was not situated

to which Mr. Rutledge replied that Mr. Jennings
did and that he answered him that he believed it was not
Upon which Mr. Jennings replied to the said Rutledge
that then Mr. St. John had the best reason to believe
Honor and to that Effect
