In the name of God Amen The Fifteenth day of June  
 in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred & twenty nine  
 I John Gowler of St Philips Charlestowne in Berkley County  
 being very sick & weak in body but of perfect mind & memory than  
 be given unto God therefore falling unto me the Mortality of my  
 Body, & knowing that this appointed for all men once to die do ma  
 gordin this my last will & Testament That is to say principally  
 first of all I give & recommend my soul into the hands of God that gave  
 it for my Body I recommend it to the Earth to be buried in a chistic  
 like & decent manner at the discretion of my Exec<sup>tor</sup> nothing doubting  
 but at the General Resurrection I shall receive the same again  
 by the mighty power of God & as touching such worldly Estate  
 wherewithal hath pleased God to bless me in this life I give  
 devise & dispose of the same in the following manner & forma  
 my debts are paid.

Item I give & bequeath to Hannah Royer the sum of five  
 pounds of good & lawfull money of this province to be raised  
 levied out of my Estate.

Item I give & bequeath unto Mary Maxwell the sum offifty  
 pounds of good & lawfull money of this province to be raised  
 as aforesaid.

Item I give and bequeath to Elizabeth Simons the sum of fifty  
Item I give & bequeath to Martha Young the sum of fifty pounds  
Item I give & bequeath to Esther Simons the sum of fifty pounds  
Item I give & bequeath to Cath. Simons the sum of fifty pounds  
Item I give & bequeath to Victor Barry the sum of one hundred  
fifty pounds.

Item I give & bequeath to Judith Simons all the remainder  
my Estate both real & personal by her freely to be possessed  
and enjoyed.

Last I constitute make & ordain my good friends James  
Maxwell & Archibald Young my only Sole Exec. of this  
Last Will & testament, to do hereby utterly disallow renn  
& disannull all & every other former Testam<sup>t</sup> Wills & legate  
bequests & Exec<sup>t</sup> by me any ways before this time named  
Willed & bequeathed Ratifying & Confirming this an  
other to be my last Will & testament In witness whereof  
I have hereunto set my hand & seal the Day & year a

The last will & testament of John Colwell Dated being now  
published in order to be proved by the witness before his honor  
& a few days being Interred by Robt. Fledge on the behalf of the  
Relatives of the said Deed the several Subscribers witnesseth  
being sworn depose as followeth.

Richard Lambton made oath that on Saturday the  
14<sup>th</sup> June instant the Deponent went to Mr. Fledge's plantation  
to pay a Visit to Mr. John Colwell who was then sick, but  
then in his perfect sense That Mr. Colwell then told the  
Deponent he was desirous to make a will but that he would  
defer it to the next morning when he expected Mr. Judith  
Simons would come out of the Country. That on Sunday  
morning Mr. Barry came to town to the Deponent & told him  
he came from Mr. Colwell who desired he would come to him  
& make his will accordingly the Deponent went to him  
about eleven of the clock in the forenoon & found him to the  
best of his knowledge in his right sense, That Mr. Colwell  
gave the Deponent Directions to draw his will & accordingly  
the Deponent did draw the will now produced as it now  
appears wch<sup>t</sup> the Deponent would not do till the afternoon  
abt four o'clock That he might the better judge  
whether he would be sensible to execute it. That the  
Deponent read it over to him & Mr. Colwell approving  
thereof, the Deponent asked him if it was drawn

according to his mind Mr. Colwell replied yes The Deponens asked if he would sign it Mr. Colwell answered he was weak but believed he could & then got up in his Bed & sat the side of a Table being brought he there signed Sealed & the instrument now produced to hereto annexed as his act for the use therin mentioned in the presence of all the Subscribing Witness & then the said Will was enclosed a paper & sealed with the same seal the Testator it delivered to Mr. Young one of the Exs there in named.

The Deponent saith that he being informed that the a few Days before had been light headed it was upon account for that reason the Deponent waited till Sunday the afternoon before he gave it him to execute.

The Deponent saith the several Legacies given in Will were entirely dictated to the Deponent by the Testator & that no other person whatsoever gave any direction the lastly the Deponent saith that he the Deponent signed his name as a witness to the said Will together with the other Witnesses in the Testator's presence.

William Weekly another Subscribing Witness deposes that on Sunday the 15<sup>th</sup> instant about four of the clock in the afternoon one Cooper came to the house of James Hearne where the Deponent then was & told Mr. Hearne that his master Mr. Colwell was very ill & desired Mr. Hearne would go to him whereupon the Deponent went along with him going to Mr. Colwell found him in his Room that he was then in his senses & the Deponent heard Mr. Lambton who was there also present ask Mr. Colwell if he would sign his Will Mr. Colwell answered yes with all his

heart; That Mr. Colwell then signed the instrument produced & sealed & delivered it as his act & Deed to the witness herein mentioned by the Deponent signed his name as a Witness in the Testator's presence, that after Mr. Colwell had executed the said Will the Deponent had discourse with the said Testator who talked very well & appeared to be in his perfect sense.

The Deponent further deposes that he reported Mr. Hearne that Mr. Colwell was out of his senses when he came away for that a little before he had gotten up & run about the Room.

James Hearne Deposes that on Sunday the 15 instant about four o'clock in the afternoon one Cooper came to the Deponent at his house & told the Deponent that his master Mr. Colwell was very ill & he believed he was mad for that he had gotten out of his Bed & Run out of Doors, that the Deponent hastened thither & found Mr. Colwell in his Room that Mr. Lambton asked Mr. Colwell if he would sign his Will & Mr. Colwell answered yes & according to Mr. Colwell did sign the instrument now produced by him sealed & delivered it as his act & Deed to the witness herein mentioned the Deponent then signed his name in the presence of the Testator & the other Witnesses, that after Mr. Colwell had so executed his said Will the Deponent heard the said Testator talk very well & believes he was in his perfect sense both before and after executing his said Will.

Depositions on the part of the several

Doctor Moultrie being sworn

Deposes that Mr. Colwell by reason of his Distemper after he had been talked with would go off a little way of what he was saying before but that he remembers not particularly on the Sunday morning the 15th when he attended him.

Joseph Cooper being sworn Deposes that about three minutes before he went to call the witness Mr. Colwell run out at his Fore Door & that Mr. Lambton & Mr. Barry were lying under a tree & Mr. Barry helped him in

Robt. Fludger being Sworne Deposes that on Sunday the 15th he spoke to Mr. Colwell & asking whether he said the prayers of the meeting whether he was going Mr. Colwell answered yes & presently after asked if the fort was gone to Market & seemed to enter into Discourse that appeared wild & not to the purpose & believes he was not in his Senses but that he did not see him from nine in the morning till 3 in the afternoon on the Day after as

Mr. Fludger being Sworne Deposes that about 10 in the forenoon of the 15 inst he saw Mr. Colwell with one foot out of the Street Door the other in & he was without his Cloaths & his Legs naked.
