State of South Carolina. In the Name of God amen. I Thomas Gresham
of Hobcaw Green Creek Plantation in the County of Charleston and State aforesaid
being weak of body but of sound and disposing mind and memory Hoped
into the Almighty God for the same, calling to mind the mortality of my
body and that it is appointed for men once to die, do make & ordain
this to be my last Will and Testament in manner and form following.

First and principally I recommend my soul into the hands of Almighty God who gave it, my body to the earth of which it was made, to be buried in a decent Christian like manner, nothing doubting, That at the General Restoration, I will receive the same again by the mighty power of God, And as touching such worldly Estate as it hath pleased God to Bless me with, I give, bequeath and dispose of it in the following manner: First that all my lawful debts be paid out of what money I have in hand, and the debt that is owing or due me at this time, to be collected. ~~2~~^{2d} I give and bequeath to my beloved Wife Frances Faubell during her natural life or widowhood, in her of all her slaves, all the plantation whereon I now live with all the plantation tools, the blacksmith tools, the cotton press, the grist mill stone, &c &c, the rest of my lands, all my household and kitchen furniture, all the plantation utensils of ~~use~~ every kind, all of my stock of horses, cattle and hogs that is not otherwise disposed of by this my will, together with their increase, all of my provisions in the houses or growing in the fields, of every kind and three negroes namely, Frank, Sam, and Martha to be for her use and support during her natural life time, or her widowhood and for the support, raising and educating of my children left with her: my desire is that the said wife, ^{2d}

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for the support, raising and educating of my children left with her.
My desire is that the children have a plain education given them provided
that they be studious to learn. 3rd My will and desire is that whenever
my wife Frances Faulling should die or should she marry before her death
then and at that time the plantation before named, with all the rest of
my Lands, the household & kitchen furniture, all the plantation tools, the
Blacksmith tools, the cotton saw gin, the grist mill attached thereto, all other
plantation utensils of every kind, all of stock of horses, cattle and hogs
that is not otherwise disposed of, together with their increase, all of the
possessions, of every kind, also the aforesaid named Negro man Frank
to go to my son Joseph B. Faulling for his use forever, and the fellow Sam
to go to my son David J. Faulling and the Negroe woman Martha with her
service to go to my daughter Lucy Jane Faulling. 4th I give and bequeath
to my daughter Elizabeth Whaley in addition to what I have already given
her, six negroes namely Old Ben, Juba his wife, Harriet Johnson
Charlotte and Pinders with their future increase. 5th I give and bequeath
to my son William Faulling, in addition to what I have already given him
all the stock of cattle that I bought and left in his care, near Parkersburg
in Cabellton District, marked in my mark and branded with my brand
to the same owner or his heirs. 6th I give and bequeath to my son James Faulling
fifty dollars to be paid him to be paid by my Executors, in addition to what I
have already given him. 7th I give and bequeath to my daughter Mary Faulling
one hundred dollars to be paid her by my Executors. 8th I give
and bequeath to my daughter Lucy Jane Faulling, three negroes man
Dennis, Tom and young Ben, in addition to what I have

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then and at that time the plantation before named, with all the rest of
my Lands, the house-hold & kitchen furniture, all the plantation tools, the
blacksmith tools, the bottom saw bin, the grist mill attached thereto, all other
plantation utensils of every kind, all of stock of horses, cattle and hogs
that is not otherwise disposed of, together with their increase, all of the
provisions, of every kind, also the aforesaid named Negro man Frank
to go to my son Joseph B. Faulling for his use forever, and the fellow Sam
to go to my son David J. Faulling and the Negroe woman Martha with her
maiden to go to my daughter Leezey Jane Faulling. ⁴ I give & bequeath
to my daughter Elizabeth Whaley in addition to what I have already given
her, six negroes namely, Old Ben, Juba his wife, Harriet, Solomon
Charlotte and Pindar with their future increase. ⁵ I give & bequeath
to my son William Faulling, in addition to what I have already given him
all the stock of cattle that I bought and left in his care, near Parkers Ferry
in Bull Run District, marked in my mark and branded on the May the
fifth day every year. ⁶ I give and bequeath to my son James Faulling
fifty dollars to be paid him to be paid by my Executrix, in addition to what I
have already given him. ⁷ I give and bequeath to my daughter Mary Fair
one hundred dollars to be paid her by my Executrix. ⁸ I give
and bequeath to my daughter Leezey Jane Faulling, three negroes more
above. But if my said Daughter Leezey should die without leaving
Issue, then and in that case he shall be equally divided between

my daughter Elizabeth Whaley and my two grand daughters
and their husbands and my son Joseph Davis if he dies before me
his share shall be equally divided between my two daughters
and my two daughters Elizabeth Whaley & Lucy Greenfield and
and desire is that after paying off all my lawful debts and expenses
made by me in this my will (to paid) out of what money I have in hand
and the debt that is owing to me being collected shall then be distributed
of money I have and my credit that to be left to Faulling for his son
H= My Will and desire is that my daughter Lucy Greenfield and my
Daughter Elizabeth Whaley have of my property to kept together with my wife
property to the better enable them to support until they come of age or marry
And I do hereby nominate constitute and appoint my sole daughter
Faulling and my much Respected Friend Revd Stephen Williams my
Executor to this my last Will and Testament. In witness whereof I have
hereunto set my hand and seal this twenty fifth day of April in the
year of our Lord One thousand Eight hundred and thirty six.
