lastly Appoint Executors to this my Will my Nephew
Thomas Broughton Senior, Alexander's Morych and Alex-
ander's Motte and have hereunto subscribed my name
and affixed my seal at Charleston this twenty eight
day of January 1800.

of Charleston Widow, do now make my last Will and Testa-
ment, hereby revoking all others. I give to my daughter Rebecca
Rose, my negro man Charles, for ever. I give to my daughter
Mary Lining, my negro man Ned, for ever. I give to my grand
daughter Maryann O'Hara, my negro girl named Mary,
with her future Issue and Increase for ever. I give to my
grand daughter Rebecca Lining, my negro girl Dye,
with her future Issue, for ever. I give to my grand daughter
Martha Woodcraft, my negro girl Belketh, with her future
Issue for ever. I give to my grand Son Richard Woodcraft,
my negro boy George, for ever. I give, devise and bequeath all
the rest, residue and remainder of my Estate, real and personal
to my two daughters, Rebecca Rose and Mary Lining,
to be equally divided between them, to hold the same to them
and their respective heirs, Executors, Administrators and
Assigns for ever, subject however to the payment of the
following sums, and with which the same is hereby charg-
ed, to wit, one hundred pounds sterling to be paid to

My daughter Rebecca Rose, and one hundred pounds
ling, to be paid by my daughter Mary Lining, with the
good interest for the time being, to commence from the
end of one year after my decease. And the said sum of
two hundred pounds I give equally between my two grand
Children Richard Woodcraft and Martha Woodcraft, to
be paid to them, as they respectively marry, or attain
the ages of twenty one years, the interest to be appropri-
ated in the mean time, to their support and education.
If either of them should die, before that period, the sur-
vivor to take the whole, and in case of the death of both
of them before such period, the same shall remain in the
hands of my said daughters for ever, or if they or either
of them be dead, to their Children, who are to represent
their parents respectively. And in consideration of my
daughter Lining's having built a house on that part
of my land called Sandy Bay, I desire that in the
division, the same shall be allotted to her, without any
regard to the value of the buildings. I appoint my
daughters Rebecca Rose and Mary Lining, and
my Cousin Charles Lining, to be Executrices and
Executor of this my Will, and guardians to my said
grand Children. In Witness whereof I have hereunto
to set my hand and seal this twenty seventh day of
June in the Year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred
Witnesses.
