

Hon. Sir Charles Town May 11th 1771
 I had the honour of your
 London 31st Jan. acknowledging the receipt

 the Packet I send you this by so cannot have

to help the settling of the Place he can inform
 for better than in my power as I have never been
 there; but proceed to answer your queries. quite
 near. here in Georgia are 3.5 to 100 Acres
 30 Negroes 20 new & 10 seasoned £1500. St. a
 Rice Plantation £2000. St. an Indigo Plantation
 from 30 to 50 St. according to the distance from town
 or a Market, an Overseer from 150 to 1000 St. according
 to his merit & recommendation. they can be had for
 something less in the Settlements here especially if the
 Owner lives on his Plantation; but require more in
 settling a new place as they are shorn of great hard-
 ships at first. Scotsmen will not do at first till the
 place is well settled; there is a great difference between
 the temperate banks of the Don & the hot sands
 of St. John's River; so whereas the climate of Greece
 a few good tradesmen may do work within doors but
 by no means in the field. If Oglethorpe failed in Georgia
 & dispersed his people all this Province where their
 posterity now remain; many of them died especially the old;

that does a great of business for other People
 but am doubtful if he would undertake it, nor
 shall I propose it to him till again from you
 he would require full & ample power of Attorney
 he would meddle in the matter, as he might
 be looser if he had not good security to go
 upon; if you have the matter very much at heart
 you may come here yourself to be better informed, the
 Governour can inform you as well as possible
 without seeing the place yourself; this is a good
 Winter Country the best time to come here is the
 month of Nov^r & to leave it May or June, a light
 Post Chaise or Chariot with 3 or 4 light Bay horses
 wh^{ch} could be sold here when you went at very little
 loss after your using them - I am obliged to you for
 kind enquiry for my success. I have bread to eat & raiment
 to put on & am thankful to God for the same, please remem-
 ber me to friends with you & I am with great respect

On the whole settling a Colony may be compared to building
 a House; the cost should be well considered before beginning
 or a great deal may be thrown away to no effect; if you
 put your hand to the work you should resolve to go on
 & expect to saw plentifully before you reap; you
 should at least have £5, 6 or 7000 ~~sterling~~ in bank to settle
 a Plantation here, or in Georgia, which
 may bring from 8 to 12 ~~p~~ cent for your money if well
 managed; which would be a most advantageous affair.
 In a Colony as it would yield provisions and
 necessaries till they could be procured there, a small
 costing vessel would be necessary to go between them
 & as there are great many concurring circumstances
 which may be compared to an Arch; if one fail the
 whole fabric falls; the principle is to have a proper
 Person here to manage the whole matter without a
 reserve as the whole concern were his own; he
 ought to have full confidence in his doing every thing
 for the best; he should have property of his own & sh^{ould}
 to manage well every respect. I know a Gentleman who
