The petition of George Norris, executor of the last will and testament of Penelope late of Saint James's Parish, Goose Creek, Spinster, deceased, sheweth that it consists entirely of two negroes, one feather bed and Furniture, which was useful estate and liable to waste and injury, and also that there is a debt due by the said Your petitioner therefore prays for permission to sell the whole Estate. George

January 13, 1795. Ordered that the Exor do immediately advertise the above property to be sold at his own house at Wasamsaw, on the fourth of February. Terms for the sale one fourth cash & for the remainder bond with interest and security, payable in cash and for the rest of the property, cash.

The Petition of Rosanna Caroline McMurry, Administratrix of the Estate and of the Rev. James Norton, late of Charleston, deceased, sheweth that there are about ten negroes and one horse belonging to this estate as will more particularly appear on the Inventory & appraisement of the same duly executed and of record in your Honor's Court that your petitioner views the said property as of a perishable nature and liable to waste & injury and considers it very desirable and most to the interest of the Estate interested therein, that the said property may be sold and after the payment of the demands as may exist against the Estate, that the proportion of said property to the minor heir of the estate is entitled may be vested in good stock until a guardian for the minor shall be legally appointed. Your petitioner therefore prays for leave to sell the aforementioned property on Monday the 17th of December next at the North wing of the Custom House. Rosanna C. McMurry.

The petition of Margaret Nowell, Executrix of the last Will and Testament of Edward Brown, late of Charleston, Gentleman, deceased, sheweth that there is a note amounting to Fifteen hundred dollars, which was given to the South Carolina Bank by the said Edward Brown in his Life-time, and which will shortly become due and that your petitioner is in possession of no other funds for its payment, but what may arise from the sale of a part of her personal Estate. Your petitioner therefore prays for permission to sell the House and Buildings on Sullivans Island, a negro fellow named Henry and a riding chair with as early as possible. Margaret Nowell.

March 1, 1802. Ordered that the Extx do immediately advertise the above property to be sold before Scott & Campbell's Vandue Store, on the twenty fifth instant. Term
