

N. 46. I, State aforesaid, being of sound and disposing mind, memory & Judgment do make & ordain this to be my last Will & Testament. I give & bequeath unto my Wife, Ann Mary Shively, All my Estate of every Description whatsoever & wheresoever upon the following trust, first to pay & satisfy all my legal & just debts, in any manner she may think proper, either by sale or otherwise of my said Estate. The rest & residue left after the pay^t of my said Debts, I bequeath unto my said Wife during her life, free from the impeachment of waste, & after her death I bequeath the same unto my two Sons John Shively & Charles Shively share & share alike or such one of them as may be alive at the time of the death of my said Wife. But should neither of them survive their said Mother it is then my desire that the same should vest absolutely in her & to her sole & separate use. I nominate, constitute & appoint my said Wife Ann Mary Shively, Executrix of this my last Will & Testament, revoking all others, heretofore made by me. Charleston 4 August 1818.

I bequeath it to the profit & disposal of the aforesaid Widow Hally & her
orphan Children - As the Gold Watch which I commonly made use of,
belongs to her, it shall be returned to the same Widow & Family - And in
order to render this my last Act & will as valid as possible, I do hereunto
set my hand, in Charleston (S. C.) on Monday morning the seventh day of
September, in the Year eighteen hundred & eighteen.
