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State of South Carolina. In the Name of God Amen. I Henry Calder
of Edisto Island in the District of Charleston, in the State aforesaid
Planter, being of sound and disposing mind memory and under-
standing do make this my last Will and Testament hereby revo-
king all former and other Wills at any time heretofore made by me
Inprimis. Should I die on or near Edisto Island, I desire my
Executors to have my body interred in the burial ground be-
longing to the Estate of the late Archibald John Calder, and where
my brother William Calder was buried. Item. Being desirous
to emancipate the following Slaves, to wit, Old Tommy the driver,
Jerry, Old Judith, Julia, and her two mulatto children, little
Mary and Moses, Polly the mulatto daughter of Clarinda and
Lijoney the mulatto Son, of Catharine, I do hereby bequeath them
to my Executors in South Carolina, or such of them as shall qual-
ify on this my Will, In trust to take the proper measures to
complete the emancipation of the aforesaid Slaves, according to
Law and to sign and execute the necessary Deeds of Manumission
in their and each of their behalf. Item. I do hereby direct and require
my Executors in the State of South Carolina, whom I shall hereinafter
appoint or such of them as shall qualify on this my Will; as soon
after my decease, as conveniently may be done, to sell or cause to be
sold, at public or private Sale, for cash or upon such terms of
credit &c. as they shall think proper.

after my decease, as conveniently may be done, to sell or cause to be sold, at public or private Sale, for cash or upon such terms of credit & security as they or he may deem proper, all and every of my plantations or tracts of Lands, all my negro or other Slaves, (except those eight Slaves above directed to be emancipated) and all my household furniture, Plantation tools, Stock of horses, cattle, sheep and hogs, crops of cotton and Provision and all other my movable Estate and Effects whereof I may be seized and possessed at the time of my death; and to make execute and deliver good and sufficient Title Deeds and Bills of Sale to the purchaser or purchasers thereof for the same, and every part thereof in fee simple. The Net Proceeds arising from the Sales thereof, I do hereby order and direct shall be applied in the manner following, to wit. To pay therefrom all my just debts and funeral expences. To my Brother John Calder of Drum-croft, I give the Sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars. To my Brother Joseph Calder in Burn-House, I give the like Sum of Fifteen thousand Dollars. To my Brother James Calder Merchant of Glasgow, if living, I give the ^{like} Sum of Fifteen thousand Dollars. But if my said Brother James be dead, leaving lawful issue, then I direct the same to be equally divided among such of his Children, as shall be living at the time of my decease. but in case he shall be dead, leaving no lawful Child or Children, then the aforesaid Sum to go to and be equally divided

Between my said two other Brothers, John Calder and Joseph
Calder. To my sister Margaret Calder in Drum-Croft, I give
the like Sum of Fifteen thousand Dollars. To my niece Janet
Nichol, Daughter of my sister Ann Calder and the wife of
John Nichol, I give the like Sum of Fifteen thousand Dollars.
To my sister Jane Calder, ^{late Jane Calder} of Broad-Shaw, the wife of Alexander
Calder of Stirling, I give the like Sum of Fifteen thousand
Dollars. To my sister Janet barlow in Midcalder, I give the
like Sum of Fifteen thousand Dollars. To the poor of the Parish of
Bathgate, I give the sum of Five thousand Dollars - to be di-
vided among them by the Parish minister of Bathgate, as
he shall deem most proper. To each of my Executors in South
Carolina, over and above their legal commissions, I give the
Sum of One thousand Dollars. To my coloured Child Polly
Daughter of Clarinda, whom I carried to Scotland some years
ago, I give the Sum of Fifteen hundred Dollars. I direct my said
Executors, that out of the aforesaid Funds, they do pay to each of
the following Slaves, to wit, Tommy, Jerry, old Judith, and below
being four of the Eight, whom I have above ordered to be eman-
cipated, the Sum of One hundred and fifty Dollars per annum
by quarterly payments, for their support and maintenance during
their respective lives. And it is my Will and desire, and I do
hereby earnestly intreat and solemnly exhort

by quarterly payments, for their support and maintenance during
their respective lives: And it is my Will and desire, and I do
hereby earnestly intreat and solemnly enjoin my Executors a-
foresaid in South Carolina, that as soon as convenient after my
decease, and after the above four mulatto children named Polly,
Mary, Moses and Gioney, shall be emancipated as I have directed
they do send or cause to be sent or carried to North Britain at the
Expenses of my Estate the other three children to wit, Mary, Moses,
and Gioney, and have them placed in some reputable family,
who will pay proper attention to their morals, and protect them from
ill-treatment; and that ~~they~~ my said Executors do forward there the
Sum of Ten thousand Dollars, to be taken out of the sales of my real and
personal property as aforesaid, to be placed by my Executors in Scotland
in some secure fund in Great Britain for the use and benefit of
said four mulatto children above named - the annual Interest
arising therefrom shall be applied towards their support and educa-
tion, until they shall respectively attain the ages of Twenty one
Years, or the females of them shall be lawfully married - when
the said Principal Sum of Ten thousand Dollars with any Interest
thereon then unappropriated shall be equally divided between
them share and share alike; and in case of the death of either of them
before he, she or they shall attain to the aforesaid ages or days of

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marriage, then the aforesaid ^{principal} sum, with the interest, if any, shall
be equally divided among the Survivors of them, and if only one
shall survive, then to that one absolutely, his or her Executors, Adm-
nistrators and Assigns forever. Item. All the rest, residue and
remainder of the monies or Securities for money arising from the
sales of my real and personal Estate as aforesaid together with all
other money, securities for money, goods chattels, estate, and effects
real or personal, and of what nature or kind soever, to which I shall
or may be entitled, or which I have or shall or may have any right
to dispose of, not hereinbefore given and bequeathed, I do hereby
give devise and bequeath unto my said two Brothers John
balder of Drum-Brop and Joseph balder of Burn-House and
my said Sister Margaret balder, to be equally divided between
them share and share alike, and to their and each of their Heirs
Executors, Administrators and Assigns forever. Lastly I do hereby no-
minate, constitute and appoint my said Brother John balder
of Drum-Brop, and Joseph balder of Burn-House, to be my Execu-
tors in North Britain: and my friends William Seabrook, Daniel
Townsend and Benjamin Bailey Esquires, of Edisto aforesaid, to be
Executors of this my last Will and Testament in South Carolina.

of Drum= Croft, and Joseph Calder of Burnhouse, to be my Executors in North Britain: and my friends William Seabrook, Daniel Townsend and Benjamin Bailey Esquiers, of Edisto aforesaid, to be Executors of this my last Will and Testament in South Carolina.
