in the Province of Carolina being sick and weak of body
and of feeble mind and strength of memory and not knowing how
I shall please God to deal with me have made and doe make this my last
will and testament revoking all former and all other wills by me made
made doe declare this to be my only last will and testament in forme
manner following: I give and bequeath my soul unto God
my heavenly Father hoping he will receive me into favour and have
mercy upon me forgiving all my sins and transgressions and my body
unto the Earth from whence it came to be buried. Next I give and be-
queath unto my well beloved wife Frances Symmons all my estate
well or ill as personall as all houses lands servants slaves and all the
Chattells or cattle whatsoever that now doth or hereafter may appertain
to be mine by any wayes or means whatsoever within this Province or
elsewhere I desire my loving friend Capt Robert Daniell to be my
Executor in trust in the behalfe of my beloved wife Frances Symmons
whom I appoint to be my sole Executrix hoping that the said Capt
Robert Daniell will aid and assist my beloved wife in the manage-
ment of all affaires and business and to see that she be not wronged
And this I subscribe to the words to be my last will and testament
