No. 8. Henry Unselt Planter in the Parish of St. James's Goose Creek
in the State of South Carolina, being sick and weak in my body, but
of perfect Mind and Memory, thanks be given unto God, therefore calling
unto Mind the Mortality of my body and knowing that it is appoint-
ed for all men once to die, do make and ordain this my last Will and
Testament, that is to say, Principally and first of all, I give and
recommend my soul into the Hands of God that gave it, and my body
I recommend to the earth, to be buried in decent Christian burial at the
discretion of my Executors, nothing doubting but at the general resurrec-
tion I shall receive the same again by the mighty Power of God, and as
touching such worldly Estate wherewith it hath pleased God to bless me
in this life, I give, demise, and dispose of the same in the following
manner and form. I give and bequeath to Christina my
dearly beloved Wife, one Negro Boy named Prince and a Negro
Girl named Molly during her natural life, and if in case any of of
them should die, she has her full choice to draw another that she likes
out of the other stock. I likewise leave her half of all my stock of Horses
Cattle Hogs &c. during her life and all my household furniture
shall be hers during the aforesaid term as also the room of the house
which is next adjoining the hall as also the use of some of the other
Buildings such as she shall have occasion for. Item, I give and bequeath
to my well beloved daughter Margaret Unselt three hundred and
twelve Acres of Land and if she should marry she is to draw one fourth
part of my whole stock and her part of the Negroes as shall be here-
after mentioned the Land to hers and her heirs for ever. Item, I give to
my well beloved Son John Unselt three hundred and twelve Acres of
Land his part is to be that where the houses stands and all the

of his Mother the whole house and out Buildings to be intirely for the use of him and his Heirs for ever, and if he should marry he is likewise to draw one fourth part of my stock that that is to say one half of the whole stock to remain with his Mother during her life and the other half to be equally divided between him and his sister and the Sisters part to be continued with her Mother until she marries and likewise the Negroes excepted those left to his Mother to be appraised and equally divided among them and his sisters part to continue as aforesaid. and I do hereby appoint him and M^r. Heating Simon to be the Executors of this my last Will and Testament. and I do hereby utterly disallow, revoke and disannul all and every former Testaments Wills Legacies and bequests, and Executors by me in any ways before named willed and bequeathed ratifying and confirming this and no other to be my last Will and Testament, in witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal the day and year above written.
