Lastly I do hereby nominate and appoint my said two Sons Samuel and John McCorkell, when they shall respectively come of age, and my good friends John McCall, John William Mills, Stephen Thomas and W. Alexander Executors of this my last Will and Testament, revoking all former Wills by me made. In Testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this eleventh day of August in the Year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and ninety four, and of American Independence the nineteenth.

14 Fe. 24. I undersigned Etienne Bellumec  
do the Town of Beresfay in the Province of Poitou, and from the 1<sup>st</sup> of  
July, one thousand seven hundred and thirty five out of  
legal marriage between Maria Françoise Richard deceased at Ber-  
chelle in the year one thousand seven hundred and forty nine,  
and Paul Bellumec de la Vincendière deceased at the Porteau in  
in St. Marc's Parish on the Island of St. Domingo in June  
one thousand seven hundred eighty four, myself late planter at  
the place called les grands Cahos in Ayromosho Parish of the  
petite riviere district of St. Marc on said Island, where I arrived  
the twenty third of June one thousand seven hundred and  
forty seven, and where I resided until the thirty first Decem-  
ber one thousand seven hundred and ninety two when in  
order to avoid being murdered by the assassins armed by the  
Civil Commissioners Polverel and Bonthonax against all the  
planters of the said Island of St. Domingo, I shipped myself  
by furlow from the Municipality of St. Marc recorded in  
that of the petite riviere my parish for North America where I  
arrived, in this City of Charleston, the 1<sup>st</sup> February one thou-  
sand seven hundred ninety three, on the brig Governor Pink-  
ney Captain Dardillier. Being far advanced in years and  
threatened to loose my eye sight, I have thought fit to anticipa-  
on that event by writing the present my Testament and  
ordinance of my last Will as follows. Born and having al-  
ways lived in the Roman Catholic faith, I request of my  
Executor hereafter named after my decease to have my body  
interred where ever he pleases in the humblest manner and  
with the least and at the smallest expence possible. I confirm  
by the present if it were necessary the freedom which I have  
given by an act to that purpose by me subscribed and before  
witnesses, the said act duly recorded in this City to my negro  
man named Jacques, born free in the said City, but who  
by the events of war, was taken prisoner and carried to  
Martinico where he was sold and from thence brought to  
St. Domingue where I bought him. And the freedom also given  
by me by another act under my signature in presence of  
witnesses and duly recorded to my negro woman Marie Noël  
born in St. Domingo. I give and bequeath unto M<sup>r</sup>. Vincent  
le Seyneur Doctor of Physick and living in this City the  
principal and my share of the profits in the copartnership  
contracted between him, my brother and me, each concerned  
for one third the fifteenth of July, one thousand ninety five,  
acknowledging by the present that I have received beyond the  
amount of my said share either by monies advanced to  
be singular to my brother and me, for our benefit or  
keep us in cloaths ever since the removal to

and ninety nine years by the rent of his own house, which he  
occupy, rent free from the same Epoch, and also in order that  
he should not be disturbed or made accountable in any manner  
whatever by my heirs in regard to the said copartnership, or  
question he would accept the above as a very weak testimony  
of my everlasting gratitude, for all the services rendered to my  
brother and me in every circumstance ever since we left St.  
Domingo which are such that, if I ever wished for the restora-  
tion of good order in that colony, it was in hopes of returning  
thither and that I should live long enough to give him some  
proofs of my friendship and sincere attachment to him.  
Moreover I give and bequeath unto him my Dictionary of  
the Accademy my french and english Dictionary of Bayr  
the Materia Medica by Lieutout and the Manuel of the Damas  
de la Charite, I beg of him the acceptance of these trifles in re-  
membrance of me. I give and bequeath unto my brother Henry  
Billumau de la Vincendiere living with me and as long as  
he remains on this continent the use of my negro man num-  
ed Janvier born in St. Domingo of about thirty years of age  
and of my negro woman named Fernande of the Mozambique  
Nation about twenty four years old and of her son named Ed-  
ward about four years and a half, this very day in order that  
they may wait upon him and facilitate to him the means of  
living here, and in case my said brother intend to leave the  
continent after my decease in order to return to St. Domingo  
or to any other Country he will inform Mr Dugas de Callon  
my son in law with his determination by writing to him at  
Fredericks Town in the State of Maryland in order that he  
may point to him the person to whom he may deliver the said  
three negroes above designed giving and bequeathing the same  
to said Mr Dugas de Callon as his own property provided he  
causes them to be sold and on the proceeds of said sale, a sum  
of two hundred dollars to be paid to Marie Noel the said free  
negro woman mentioned in the present, and overplus of said  
said proceeds will be applied to the reimbursement of the monies  
by him generously advanced to my brother and me for our  
existence, for the balance of accounts between my above said  
son in law and me signed the fifteenth of January last, also  
for three pounds fifteen shillings which I have received on his  
account from Mr. Hazlehurst the twenty second of October last,  
and the balance if any remains applicable to the legal interest  
of his advances. I give and bequeath unto Miss De Peppé a small

mahogany bureau the upper part  
for the overplus of what it may possess in Charleston and being  
in nature wearing apparel, watch trinkets and other articles of  
nature whatever such as they be, and which I should not have ex-  
posed of already I give and bequeath them unto my executors to  
do with them what he will think proper for my property  
on the Island of St. Domingo before the revolution and then  
at the grande Cahos and also may store at present St. Germain  
parish petite riviere district of St. Marc on said Island, they  
belong by right half to my Wife, our property being in common  
and the other half to the children issued of our marriage. My  
Executor hereafter named will find in my large chest a file of papers  
sealed which are the only ones to belong to my Wife by the way  
she herself will choose, and to her he will forward before he has a  
certificate of my decease with the french Consul there, she will  
find in said file of papers a copy of the present Testament.  
My Executor will likewise forward to Mr Dugas de Callon  
my Son in law another file of papers also sealed, which he  
will find in the same chest, and containing also a copy of  
my will in what he is concerned. And for the execution of  
the present Will and Testament presuming that Messrs. Lepe-  
nay and my brother being legatees cant be invested with the  
execution of the present, I name appoint and institute the one  
in the absence of the other Messrs. James Delavine and  
De Peppé both of this City merchants requesting they would  
show me this last token of their friendship which dead from  
them will be the more meritorious as considering the situation  
of my State, it will be gratuitous. Done in Charleston South  
Carolina the twentieth January eight hundred and two  
without any Cyphers, erasures and signed at the bottom of  
each page. It is a error if I have advanced in the above, that  
my acct current with Mr Dugas de Callon was signed on the  
fifteenth January last it was so the fifteenth January one  
thousand eight hundred and one. The two hundred dollars  
which I direct my said Mr Dugas de Callon my son in law  
to cause to be paid to Marie Noel a free black woman are  
to acquit myself towards her for so much due her by me, and  
it having been until now out of my power to pay her, she has  
no other titles for the claiming of that sum but her confidence  
me and my honesty. I avouch by the present Testament any  
others which I might have written before the said present  
Will, done at Charleston some date and year as above.

In the Name of God Amen, I John Miller of Beauford in  
Sullivan, being of sound mind, but afflicted with sickness of body so  
great and certain this my last Will and Testament, first I name  
my soul to the most holy and adorable trinity hoping  
thru the merits of my Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ a happy  
eternity. The property I now possess being about three hundred  
and fifty dollars slave and bequeath to and for the use of the  
Roman Catholic Church of Charleston first paying thereout  
all my just debts, Doctors bill, boarding House bill and funeral  
expenses. Item I desire that my wearing apparel be given to  
the poor. And I hereby nominate and appoint Edmund Mead  
Phelon and Samuel Corlett my executors to this my last Will  
and Testament. Given under my hand and seal at Charleston  
the 14<sup>th</sup> August 1802.

hundred and two and in the twenty sixth Year of American

tisfied. Item I will and bequeath unto my Nephew Josiah  
Rivers Harvey his heirs and assigns for ever, all that plantation in  
tract of land whereon I now reside situate lying and being in the  
parish aforesaid also the following negroes viz, Toby, Sally, Charles  
Senah and family. Item I give unto my Niece Mary Gracy Shirley  
a negro girl named Eliza, to her and to her heirs for ever. Item I give  
and bequeath unto my Nephew Sebastian Shirley a negro boy named  
Bob, to him and his heirs for ever. Item I give and bequeath unto  
my beloved Sister Susannah Frances Harvey her heirs and assigns  
for ever the following negroes Robbin, Remond, Lester, Tolson, Rags,  
Sam and old dommy. Item I direct that the fellow named Will on  
whom I leave be left free and be protected by my executor hereafter  
named, the residue of property consisting of Horses, Cows, boats &c  
I give unto my said Sister. I do hereby nominate and appoint  
Benjamin Harvey of Charleston in the State aforesaid Executor  
to this my last Will and Testament. In witness whereof I have
