Before me underwritten Simon Jude Chancogney, agent of the general commissariat of the french republic to the United States of America, invested with the direction of the commissariat of Charleston State of South Carolina, in presence of the Witnesses hereunder named and underwritten, my present Citizen Pierre Blondel, born at Saussignac, department of the Dordogne, aged about forty nine years, formerly practising the law in the Island of Guadeloupe, and now living accidentally in the City of Charleston, found in an upper room of the house which he occupies, corner of Meeting and Society Streets, lying on his bed, sick in his body, but sound of mind, memory, judgment and understanding, as has appeared to me the above said Agent and the underwritten Witnesses, who have requested of me to receive his last dispositions and in consequence thereof has dictated to me word for word his present Will and Testament as follows. I give and bequeath to the Citizen's Marie Barbe Arsonneau, Wife of the Citizen Edme Champy, living in this Town all and generally what I possess in the United States, and which will be found after my decease, the whole
